

### Introduction

Since August 2015, Richmond Valley Council has been meeting with, surveying and calling for ideas from our community to feed into the next Community Strategic Plan. This feedback sets out the vision for the next ten years in the Richmond Valley, and will directly influence Council's next four-year Delivery Plan and one-year Operational Plan.

### Methodology

### **Key questions**

In line with Integrated Planning and Review guidelines from the Office of Local Government, Richmond Valley Council consultation has been guided by the following four questions for reviewing past and creating new Community Strategic Plans:

Where are we now?
Where do we want to be in ten years' time?
How will we get there?
How will we know we've arrived?

Treatment of these questions has been interpreted differently according to the type of consultation and audience. For example, these questions were used as the basis for internal staff workshops in May and June 2016, with resulting valuable operational insights as well as suggestions for the broader community.

Consultations with the broader community have focused more on the visioning aspect of where the community wants to be in ten years' time, and how that can be achieved. Community consultation has consisted of the following methods:

### Face to face

Council's face to face consultation has involved a range of public meetings. These have included:

- **Issue-based meetings** where Council staff have met with specific community sectors and groups e.g. residents with disabilities, sporting groups, community groups.
- **Town-based listening tour meetings**, where members of the public have been welcomed to suggest ideas to Councillors and the Executive in an informal workshop format.



• Signature project nights for the Casino Drill Hall and Casino Civic Hall, and a Community Workshop night in Evans Head, where Council staff set up chalkboards with pictures and suggestions for residents to add to.



### Online communication

Four surveys have provided residents with other ways to have their say on Richmond Valley into the future. These have included:

- A Broadwater town survey created and conducted by residents in April 2016. This was a great
  initiative on behalf of Broadwater residents and has been a valuable resource particularly heading
  into the November 2016 Listening Tour where Councillors visited Broadwater again.
- A SurveyMonkey survey focused on disability inclusion action planning, in May 2016 (51 respondents). This was created in line with new Local Government Act requirements for all councils to have a Disability Inclusion Action Plan by July 2017, and in collaboration with five other Northern Rivers Councils. This survey has identified the top priorities for disability inclusion in the Richmond Valley and allows Council's Disability Inclusion Action Plan to be integrated into the new Community Strategic Plan.
- A SurveyMonkey community survey, in July 2016 (75 respondents). This was a general
  request for comments from the community on what they felt Council had previously done well,
  what Council could improve and the community's vision for 2030. Suggestions were broad,
  ranging from ideas for new events to requests for less red tape and more cycleways.
- A telephone poll conducted by Micromex Consulting, in August 2016 (403 respondents).
   This allowed a more quantitative look at residents' priorities, including on eight Council Signature Projects, and suggested that roads, communication and employment were a high priority for residents.

### Overall themes across public meetings and surveys

Richmond Valley people really value:

### 1. OUR COMMUNITY; LIVING

Their community – for help, for health, and for fun
Many community groups want straightforward support for their community programs, advocacy
on health, and for building maintenance and upgrades.

The general community also really love events that connect people. For example, there were a number of requests for Christmas events in smaller towns and further promotion of Beef Week.

### Maintenance of infrastructure

Many respondents noted that the Richmond Valley has nice facilities but would appreciate greater attention to maintenance (Evans Head Aquatic Centre for example) or that Council could upgrade newer facilities e.g. add on to the Stadium.

### Parks and open spaces

Lots of comments were received regarding making parks and riverbanks user friendly, and requests for maintenance of park / sporting field equipment and upgrades

### The basics

Residents want clear footpaths, mowing, roads, good management of waste and recycling – general accessibility and good upkeep.



### Talking to the Towns of the Richmond Valley

The Richmond Valley is a disparate population of approximately 23,000 spread over 3,407 square kilometres in two towns, three villages and additional numerous rural localities. As such, residents are always interested in 'their patch' and want to know what's going on and what Council is doing for their street and their town.

In recognition of this, Council staff and Councillors, the General Manager and Mayor conducted public meetings, surveys and online calls for information focusing on town-specific and site-specific issues, covering Broadwater, Casino, Coraki, Evans Head, Rappville and Woodburn.

Although responses were town-specific, common themes emerged from these consultations as well, and included ideas for: open spaces, playgrounds, parks, streetscapes, public art, foreshores, riversides and beaches, walkways and nature trails, and specifically, Casino's Drill Hall, Civic Hall, shark nets, and Evans Head river and surf areas.

### **Additional Consultations**

### **Schools**

Schools were contacted in the Richmond Valley in October 2016 to encourage young people to provide their views on what the Richmond Valley needs. Young people aged 12 to 18 years of age identified the following as priorities: improved sport and recreation facilities, the lack of public transport within the Richmond Valley (eg between Casino and Evans Head) and to other Northern Rivers towns, more recycling, lots of ideas for events and activities for young people, and many suggestions for businesses to open. Specific ideas and items of importance also included:



### **Disability Inclusion**

In May 2016, Richmond Valley Council consulted with people with disabilities, disability sector workers and interested community members on disability inclusion and accessibility. This was via a region-wide survey covering the Northern Rivers Local Government Areas of Ballina Shire, Byron Shire, Clarence Valley, Kyogle, Lismore as well as Coffs Harbour City and Richmond Valley. This survey yielded the following four priorities

- Ensuring public events are accessible (changing attitudes and behaviours)
- Providing continuous accessible paths of travel between facilities and services in town centres and public areas (making communities liveable and accessible for people with disabilities)
- Changing people's attitudes towards employing people with disabilities (improving employment opportunities for people with disabilities)
- Ensuring all information is available in different formats for all abilities (improving accessibility of systems and processes)

### **Summary of Micromex Telephone Poll**

In August 2016, Micromex Research undertook a telephone poll of 403 residents of the Richmond Valley, across all age ranges of residents. This research will inform Richmond Valley Council's new Community Strategic Plan.

Overall the results were very encouraging, with community satisfaction with Council increasing, and clear direction given by the community as to:

- Areas where Council could improve community satisfaction, and
- Community priorities for services and signature projects.

Following is a high level summary of the Community

Research report provided by Micromex Research. For further information on results of the research poll please refer to the original report.

### **High Level Results and Priorities**

### How satisfied are residents with Council's performance overall?

- 94% of residents were at least 'somewhat satisfied' with Council performance a significant increase since 2013 (82%), when previous polling was last conducted
  - o This is also significantly higher than the average for all NSW Councils

### How do residents feel about Council's level of communication with the community?

- 83% of residents were at least 'somewhat satisfied' with Council's current level of communication with the community
  - This is consistent with 2013 levels

### What do residents most value about the Richmond Valley?

- 31% of residents indicated that they most value the Richmond Valley's 'community spirit and friendly people'
- 21% of residents value 'location and their access to services / facilities'
- 21% of residents value 'peace and quiet' that the area provides
- 14% of residents value our 'natural environment / scenery'

### What do residents believe the Richmond Valley's top priorities should be for the next 5 years?

- 31% of residents said 'local employment'
- 29% of residents said 'road maintenance / infrastructure'
- 11% of residents said 'crime reduction and public safety'
- 9% of residents said 'health services and facilities'



### What additional areas would improve community satisfaction with Council?

Residents rated the following eleven areas as having the highest importance:

- 1. Local employment
- 2. Maintaining local roads
- 3. Support for young people
- 4. Support for people on low incomes
- 5. Health services
- 6. Lighting in public places
- 7. Long term town planning for the Richmond Valley Council area
- 8. Community engagement / consultation
- 9. Opportunity to participate in Council's decision making processes
- 10. Financial management
- 11. Economic development of the Richmond Valley

By addressing these areas, Council will have the greatest impact on improving community satisfaction.


### **Key Observations from Micromex Research**

- 85% of residents were most supportive of the Casino Rail Freight Terminal.
- Residents were least supportive of the Northern Rivers Rail Trail.
- Women were significantly more supportive of the Civic Hall Upgrade, whilst men were more supportive of the 'Nammoona Industrial Precinct'.
- 18-24 year old residents and residents from villages were more supportive of the Woodburn Riverfront Project.

### **Discussion of Signature Projects**

Over the past 18 months, Council has identified eight Signature Projects in order to focus efforts on funding these for the most gain.

- 1. **The Civic Hall Upgrade** involves restoration work to repair and update the building, to ensure it remains a premier cultural centre in Casino.
- 2. **The Casino Drill Hall building and grounds** require development e.g. with gardens and updated interior for community use.
- 3. **The Casino Amphitheatre and Riverbank Improvements** include an open air stage for public performances and area to enhance the riverbank.
- 4. **The Woodburn Riverfront Project** will upgrade picnic and playground facilities and buildings as a tourism drawcard ahead of the Pacific Highway Bypass expected in 2018.
- 5. **The Northern Rivers Livestock Exchange** will upgrade capacity and safety of the current facilities.
- 6. **The Nammoona Industrial Precinct** near the sale yards and Casino landfill will expand the current industrial area with more facilities to increase business and employment.
- 7. **The Casino Rail Freight Terminal** will have an upgrade with a rail freight terminal and grain terminal to increase business and employment.
- 8. **The Northern Rivers Rail Trail** will link Casino to Lismore through to Murwillumbah as a cycling and walking track on the old railway line. This will be a partnership with other local councils.



### **Recommendations for Signature Projects**

Based on this research, Council should:

- Recognise residents' support for Signature Projects,
- 2. Continue to actively connect with the community via dedicated engagement to inform and involve, and
- Explore and understand expectations around local infrastructure and transport areas.

### Viewing Tour for the Community Strategic Plan

In May 2017, Council again visited Broadwater, Casino, Coraki, Evans Head, Rappville and Woodburn as part of the exhibition period with the following draft documents:

- Richmond Valley Made 2030 Community Strategic Plan
- Delivery Program 2017/2021
- Operational Plan 2017/2018 (including Draft Financial Estimates 2017/2021)
- Revenue Policy 2017/2018
- Draft Disability Inclusion Action Plan 2017/2018
- Community Consultation Report 2017

Residents gave responses and suggestions across the full area of Council services, community interests and infrastructure and areas of influence:

- Improvements for Casino Swimming Pool and for a heated pool in Casino
- A suggestion that bridges be identified for maintenance and renewal
- Support for the Jabiru Genebeeinga Bird Sanctuary and Wetlands, and a suggestion against the development of land opposite the EH Memorial Aerodrome for residential purposes (due to endangered pygmy perch)
- Developing and supporting a strong fine arts community
- Support for a hockey field in Coraki
- Signage, road works and beautification works in Coraki
- Support for healthy and active lifestyles
- Suggestion for an outdoor training circuit / outdoor gym to be included in Botanical Gardens at Casino Drill Hall
- Suggestion for an outdoor gym (similar to Iluka exercise centre) in Coraki riverfront precinct
- Installation of a pontoon jetty at the existing boat ramp in Rileys Hill
- Support for the Disability Inclusion Action Plan
- Support for the Coraki Riverfront Upgrade
- Comments on the Rail Trail
- Ongoing recognition and partnership with local Aboriginal community and organisations, including recognition of the Bundjalung Nation as traditional custodians of the land, e.g. Reconciliation Action Plan
- 50 submissions focusing on Broadwater community recreation spaces, mostly opposition to skate park in Broadwater being a priority and in current proposed location near residential housing, but also including support for Council purchasing riverfront land for future public park space, a bike track between Rileys Hill and Broadwater, access to beach, access to the river, town beautification, more / better guttering and footpaths, local transport, maintenance of the koala park, fixing (or advocating for fixing) the Broadwater lookout, making the tennis court a multisports, free venue, capitalising on tourism attractions, and more undercover seating, picnic tables, landscaping and a barbecue area
- 30 submissions in favour of a skate park / youth space in Broadwater
- Support for Council advocacy for expansion of public transport, including additional accessible services suitable for people with disabilities
- More focus on renewables
- Support for affordable housing
- Suggestions regarding water and waste, including clean-up of effluent running into Broadwater National Park from the Evans Head sewerage treatment plant; and to consider a constructed wetland as part of this

There were also requests for further consultation with community, including:

- A suggestion to review rates in Evans Head
- Concerns over Northern Rivers Livestock Exchange charges, including a request for further consultation
- A request by the Broadwater community for further consultation on community recreation spaces
- A request to revisit the Broadwater survey of April 2015
- Request for consultation with Aboriginal community and broader Evans Head community on Razorback Lookout proposed walking track
- A request for further information regarding Nammoona Industrial Precinct, on Council's new technology investments in the waste-to-energy sector for this precinct
- Request for a hydrology report on Woodburn Riverside Park to examine effects of flooding

Further comments for the towns taken specifically from the Viewing Tours have been included in Attachment A.

### Conclusion

Richmond Valley residents care about services, infrastructure, face to face contact, employment, roads, good communication, love the outdoor lifestyle, being connected and are very proud of our towns and public areas. Great ideas have come out of consultations, and a positive focus for Richmond Valley Council to provide more of what residents, businesses and visitors want and need.
