

Cold snap not quite a record breaker

Despite dropping to more than 10 degrees below average, last Thursday's chilly top of for the week at the Cobar Meteorologica just 15.5 degrees is still three degrees above Cobar's coldest recorded October day.

That record was set in 1981, when October 3 reached a top of just 12.9 degrees.

Prought conditions return to area.

Regions north and west of Cobar have crops in the north western region. been declared in 'marginal' drought condition for the first time in well over a year.

An extended period without significant rainfall has seen the NSW Department of Primary Industries declare the north western area of the Darling Livestock Pest and Health Authority (LHPA) region (which includes the Cobar district) marginal, dropping from satisfactory status previously held.

According to the September Agricultural Conditions Report released by the DPI 15.9 per cent of the state has been declared marginal, compared with last month where the entire state was declared satisfactory.

Bureau of Meteorology figures show north western NSW was the only region of the state not to receive good rainfall during August.

"The northern half of NSW generally recorded falls up to 50mm, though some areas received no rain," the report found.

A report by Peter Matthews from the NSW DPI into the condition of crops and pastures get the crops up and going before the sq across the state found it was a critical time for face dries out," he said.

"The condition of the NSW winter crop co tinues to diverge across the state, with easte regions still looking at above average yield compared with large areas of the western r gions now heading to potentially below average yields," Mr Matthews said.

"If the dry conditions experienced in Augu continue into September, some of the state 5.11million hectare winter crop will be at ris

Mr Matthews also provided information feed conditions for livestock.

"Pasture growth of annual species is still slo with the frost retarding growth and limiting stockfeed.

"Overall pasture conditions across the sta declined through August on the back of belo average rainfall and frosty conditions," N Matthews reported.

"Some earlier summer crop sowing is takir place in north western NSW as growers look
