WAKOOL SHIRE COUNCIL DRAFT BUDGET AMENDED

Wakool Shire Council's draft budget for 2014/2015 will be amended following a freeze on indexation of Local Government Financial Assistance Grants for the next three years from July.

Wakool Shire Council resolved to make changes to the draft budget at its Ordinary Meeting held on 21 May 2014. Council originally endorsed its draft budget documents at a Special Council Meeting on the 14 May.

"Council has had to change the draft budget in light of the Federal Government's announcement that there will be a freeze on the indexation of Financial Assistance Grants. The impact removes \$105,000 of revenue from our draft budget for 2014/2015," Wakool Shire Council Mayor Cr Neil Gorey said.

The compounding effect on the draft 10-year Long Term Financial Plan is a \$3.2 million reduction in revenue.

"While Council is still viable, this suspension has had an effect on the upcoming budget and long term financial plan," Cr Gorey said.

Cr Gorey added that Council would maintain expenditure on services and operations at the same levels as for the current financial year. It will be reviewing the organisation to find operational savings and is now planning on a reduction in working capital in 2014/2015.

"There is a cumulative effect. Council now has to look at what we will do to reduce expenditure and increase revenue. We will have to explore achieving this reduction through freezing expenditure on maintenance and Council operations across the board."

Cr Gorey said that it was too late to start the process for a special rate variation for the upcoming financial year – the increase in rates for 2014/2015 is pegged at 2.3%.

"In the longer term, we'll be looking at a special rate variation, starting from the 2015/2016 financial year. This must be done through a community consultation process and application to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART).

"We will be looking to commence this consultation process very soon, within the next couple of months."

Wakool Shire Council General Manager Bruce Graham said the organisation was not looking at major structural changes.

"We have undertaken a review as we usually do – as we did in the lead up to the 2014/2015 budget, before this announcement from the Federal Government. However there will be no major changes to the current staff structure," he said.

Councillors have elected to reduce their current allowance to the minimum Councillor allowance level and will not accept a 2.5% increase they are eligible to receive in 2014/2015. The Mayoral allowance will also be frozen at the current level for the next financial year.

Council will also write to the NSW Minister for Local Government, The Hon Paul Toole MP, regarding the impact of the indexation freeze. It will also write to the Federal Treasurer Joe Hockey expressing disappointment regarding the decision.

Despite the Financial Assistance Grants indexation freeze, Council's upcoming budget includes a number of initiatives, focusing on local roads and bridges, projects and economic development.

The budget makes provision for the implementation of the accelerated timber bridge replacement program for local roads, with five timber bridges to be completed during the 2014/2015 financial year.

There is also \$1.158m for roads and bridge maintenance, \$556,000 for the rural roads resealing program and \$350,000 for gravel re-sheets and formation works.

More than \$1.5m will go towards town maintenance and construction, including \$856,300 for town works maintenance, \$138,000 for Council's resealing program and \$120,000 towards the Stormwater Drainage Strategy for Barham and Moulamein.

The upcoming budget also makes allowance for Council's Economic Development and Tourism Manager position and an update of the Shire's Economic Development Strategy.

The Moulamein Hub and Barham Q Centre projects have also been allocated \$50,000 each for scoping and plan preparation.

"It's great to see the Moulamein Hub and the Barham Q Centre receive money towards scoping and planning, while Council is also continuing with the redevelopment of the Shire offices at Moulamein, which is progressing well," Cr Gorey said.

Submissions to the budget documents will close at 5.00pm on Tuesday, 24 June 2014 and will be considered at a Council meeting to be held at the end of June 2014.

SUMMARY OF MAJOR OUTCOMES FROM WAKOOL SHIRE COUNCIL MAY MEETING

DA 37/14 – Dwelling House and building (swimming pool) – 1 Carne Street, Moulamein

Subject to consent conditions, Council approved the re-siting of a house and construction of a building (swimming pool) at Lot 1, 1 Carne Street, Moulamein. The current residence at 1 Carne Street will be relocated to allow for the re-siting. The building that was formerly known as the Moulamein Retirement Village will be relocated to the site. The proposed relocated building will be elevated to a height of 2200mm, creating a two storey home. An in-ground swimming pool will be installed at the rear of the home.

DA 39/14 – Recreation area (ancillary building – Stage 1 and Stage 2) – Lot 53 and 54, Barham Recreation Reserve, Cobwell Street, Barham

Council approved the Stage 1 and Stage 2 development of a multi-purpose complex at the Barham Recreation Reserve, subject to consent conditions. The complex will include clubrooms, change rooms and other community, sporting and recreational activities at the recreation reserve. A 12-space car park is included as part of Stage 1 of the development.

DA 46/14 – dwelling house, storage shed, home business and home industry – Lot 2, 3 Kidman Reid Drive, Murray Downs

Subject to consent conditions and a reduction in the size of the proposed storage shed, Council approved the construction of a single storey four bedroom home and a storage shed at Lot 2, 3 Kidman Reid Drive, Murray Downs. As well as housing a vehicle, the shed will accommodate a home-based IT business, equipment storage and wine making activities.

Amended plans must be submitted to Council detailing a reduction in the length of the proposed storage shed from 24,300mm to 18,300mm. This is to ensure the development meets the objectives of the Wakool Shire Council DCP 2013 and to minimise any impacts on the adjoining land.

Review of the NSW Waste and Environment Levy – consultation by NSW EPA

Council authorised the Deputy General Manager to prepare a submission on behalf of the Wakool Shire Council to the independent review of the waste and environment levy. Council's submission will oppose the expansion of the levy across NSW.

Council will also bring forward to RAMROC the proposal that the container deposit levy scheme be implemented in NSW.

Donation of Kubota mower to Tooleybuc Recreation Reserve

Council approved the donation of a Kubota mower to the Tooleybuc Recreation Reserve. The donation, valued at \$4,000, will be funded from working capital. A second Kubota mower will be retained by Council as a spare mower for use in water treatment plant maintenance.

Tenders – Barham Cleaning Contract

Council accepted the tender by Katherine O'Brien for the Barham Cleaning contract for a term of three years.

Cr Jackson and Cr Membrey declared a conflict of interest in the item and left the chambers during the presentation and consideration of the report.



Partnership agreement – Gannawarra Shire Council and Wakool Shire Council

Wakool Shire Council resolved to enter into a partnership agreement with Gannawarra Shire Council. This follows a joint meeting between the two councils held last month. The agreement acknowledges a commitment from both Councils to work co-operatively to achieve common goals, efficiency and increase quality and range of services to residents.

Engineering operations

An information report was presented regarding works carried out or planned in the Shire. Some of these works include:

- Works on Maude Road are finished and the road sealed.
- MR319 Thule and Gonn Street reconstruction is ongoing. The kerb and gutter islands are complete.
- A number of roads have been graded around the Shire.
- The design, fabrication drawing and bolt take-off for Nacurrie Road North Bridge over Yarrien Creek and Marunda Road Bridge over Coolbool Creek is complete.
- Steel beams and piling will be delivered for Nacurrie and Marunda bridges over two weeks starting late May. The piling contractor will be on site within two weeks.
- Sewer junction repairs for the Barham Sewer Relining are ongoing.
- Work is progressing on the erosion and retaining wall remediation by Comdain Infrastructure. Designs for the retaining wall steps have been finalised.
- The design of the viewing deck over the intake structure for the Barham Boardwalk is finished, with fabrication works on the viewing deck to start.
- Noxious weeds prevention activities have been carried out, including site inspections and on-ground control.

Memorandum of Understanding AVRWMG data collection and reporting guideline pilot project

Council noted an information report detailing the AVRWMG Data Collection and Reporting Guideline Pilot Project by the Gippsland Regional Waste Management Group and the Central Regional Waste Management Group. The purpose is to streamline the process of calculating volumes of waste streams entering each facility, allowing for more accurate waste disposal figures.

Mayoral Minute – impact of the decision to freeze indexation on Financial Assistance Grants for the next three years

The Draft Operational Plan, Delivery Program and Long Term Financial Plan will be amended following the announcement in the 2014 Federal Budget that indexation of Local Government Financial Assistance Grants will be suspended for three years starting July 2014.

The March 2014 Quarterly Budget Review will also be adjusted following the announcement that the Federal Government will not make any advance payments of the 2014/2015 Local Government Financial Assistance Grants in 2013/2014.

Council will write to the NSW Minister for Local Government, The Hon Paul Toole MP, regarding the impact of the indexation freeze. It will also write to the Federal Treasurer Joe Hockey expressing disappointment regarding the decision.

SUMMARY OF MAJOR OUTCOMES FROM WAKOOL SHIRE COUNCIL JUNE MEETING

DA 49/14 – Dwelling house, carport and detached shed – Lot 3, North Barham Road, Barham

Subject to consent conditions, Council approved the construction of a single-storey house, a detached double carport and detached Colorbond shed at Lot 3, North Barham Road in Barham.

Cr Jackson and Cr Membrey declared a conflict of interest in the item and left the chambers during the presentation and consideration of the report.

Review of Wakool Development Control Plan 2013

Council approved the draft amendments regarding the appropriate maximum sizes for detached buildings to be included in the Wakool Development Control Plan (DCP) 2013.

The draft amendments follow a request from Council to review the Wakool DCP after a number of development applications seeking variation of the size of detached buildings (such as a shed, garage or carport) set by the Wakool DCP 2013.

The draft amendments will be placed on public exhibition. After the public exhibition period a further report will be presented to Council to consider and adopt the amendments.

Proposed call for Expressions of Interest – sale and development of 10 Morago Street, Moulamein

Council agreed to seek Expressions of Interest to purchase and develop a site at 10 Morago Street in Moulamein, which is owned by Wakool Shire Council. Council has been contacted by a local tradesman who is proposing to purchase the site to develop four residential flats.

A further report will be presented to Council for consideration following the Expression of Interest period.

Murray Towns Flood Study

Council adopted the draft reports from the Murray Towns Flood Study, which assesses the Murray River flooding conditions at Barham, Murray Downs and Tooleybuc.

The Murray Towns Flood Study was commissioned by the Wakool Shire Council (with funding from the NSW Government), and was overseen by Council's Floodplain Risk Management Committee.

The reports will be placed on exhibition for 30 days for public comment.

Playground replacements and refurbishments

Council confirmed its Playground Equipment replacement program, with Moulamein to be the priority in 2014/2015. The replacement program will consist of:

- Installation of a climbing net and renewal of junior (boat) section at Barham Riverside Park.
- Replacement of Noorong Street Playground with equipment removed from Barham Riverside Park.
- Renewal of junior (boat) section at Tooleybuc Riverside Park.
- Renewal of junior (train) section at Moulamein Howard Park.
- Renewal of junior (boat) section and minor items as required at Murray Downs Pirate Park.



Barham Local Health Medical Trust – request to waive development application fees on DA 25/14

Council agreed to waive the development application fees for the Barham Local Health Medical Trust (LHMT) for renovations to the Barham Medical Centre after a request from the trust. Council will reimburse \$1240.95 to the Barham LHMT as a contribution towards the renovations.

Cr Membrey declared a conflict of interest in the item and left the chambers during the presentation and consideration of the report.

Councillors and Mayor annual fees - 2014/2015

Council adopted its annual fees, payable to Councillors for the 2014/2015 financial year at the minimum amount payable for a Category Rural at \$8,130. The fee payable to the Mayor for 2014/2015 was set at \$22,870, the same fee as the previous year. The fees are effective from the 1 July.

Councillors elected to reduce their current fees to the minimum payable and freeze the Mayoral allowance at its current level. This follows the 2014 Federal Budget decision to freeze indexation on Local Government Financial Assistance Grants for the next three years.

Tooleybuc Central School – financial support to host a public forum on the drug "ice"

Council will provide \$250 to Tooleybuc Central School towards the hosting of a public forum about the drug ice. The forum will include an expert from the Pennington Institute and a wide range of local professionals including from the police and community health.

Wakool Shire Council draft 2014/2015 draft budget documents

Following the public consultation period and with no submissions received, Council adopted the 2014/2015 budget and Community Strategic Plan. Council also elected to set aside \$5,000 for ANZAC Day recognition throughout the Shire in 2015.

The budget includes implementation of the accelerated timber bridge replacement program for local roads, with five timber bridges to be completed during the 2014/2015 financial year. There is also \$1.158m for roads and bridge maintenance, \$556,000 for the rural roads resealing program and \$350,000 for gravel re-sheets and formation works.

The Moulamein Hub and Barham Q Centre projects have also been allocated \$50,000 each for scoping and plan preparation.

Council made changes to the draft budget at last month's Ordinary Meeting after the announcement of a freeze on indexation of Local Government Financial Assistance Grants for the next three years.

S355 Committees – 2014/2015 Dollar for Dollar Grant Applications

Council approved all S355 Committee Dollar for Dollar grants applications for the 2014/2015 financial year. The 2014/2015 has provided \$40,000 for funding of dollar for dollar grant projects and another \$10,000 matched on dollar for dollar basis for any unforeseen maintenance needs throughout the year.

Council received four grant applications from Barham, Moulamein and Tooleybuc Management Committees at the total value of \$10,497 (ex GST), of which Council is asked to contribute \$5,248. As per normal practice, any unspent funds at the end of the year will be transferred to reserves for future allocation.

Policy – Councillor Expenses and Provision of Facilities

Council adopted the draft 2014/2015 Councillor Expenses and Provision of Facilities Policy, which will be placed on public exhibition for 28 days for comment. The policy's procedures outline the expenses that can be claimed by (or paid on behalf of) Councillors, and the facilities provided by Council to enable Councillors to carry out their civic duties.





Engineering operations

An information report was presented regarding works carried out or planned in the Shire. Some of these works include:

- MR319 Thule and Gonn Street reconstruction is complete. Line marking and landscaping will be completed in due course.
- Murray Constructions are scheduled to start works at Nacurrie Bridge for the installation of bridge piles.
- Traffic counts have been put in place on the Punt Road and Moulamein Road intersection, Lawson Road and Moulamein Road intersection and Moulamein Road.
- A number of roads have been graded around the Shire.
- Disabled parking has been installed in front of the Barham Medical Centre. Works included the pulling up of the pavement which was concreted and installation of a pram crossing.
- Work is progressing on the erosion and retaining wall remediation at Barham by Comdain Infrastructure. Concrete pre-cast panels have been installed and works will start on construction of a timber façade for the front of the panels.
- Town maintenance is taking place across the Shire.
- Sewer junction repairs for the Barham Sewer Relining are continuing.
- The viewing deck over the intake structure for the Barham Boardwalk has been fixed into place.
- Flood Risk Draft Plans have been finalised.

SUMMARY OF MAJOR OUTCOMES FROM WAKOOL SHIRE COUNCIL SEPTEMBER MEETINGS

Special Council Meeting

Cr Neil Gorey was returned as Wakool Shire Council Mayor for the next 12 months and Cr Anthony Jackson was re-elected as Deputy Mayor. Both the Mayor and Deputy Mayor were elected unopposed.

Following the election of the Mayor and Deputy Mayor, Council determined dates for its Ordinary Meetings of Council.

From October 2014 to September 2015 Council will generally meet at 2pm at the following locations:

Ordinary Council Meeting

Murray Darling Association 70th Annual Conference

Council will send delegates to attend the Murray Darling Association's 70th National Conference in Tumut from the 14 to 16 October. All costs associated with the conference will be met by Council.

Planning proposal – Murray Downs-Swan Hill Bridge

Council declined the request to undertake a Planning Proposal to amend the Wakool Local Environmental Plan to rezone Lot 1 DP 1134973 from RU1 Primary Production to R5 Large Lot Residential.

Council will investigate funding options to review the existing Wakool Land Use Strategy as it relates to Murray Downs.

RAMROC – Regional Waste Strategy 2014-2020

Council formally adopted the RAMROC Regional Waste Strategy 2014-2020, and will implement activities associated with the strategy. The strategy provides a unified approach for member Councils across the region to improve waste management, including recycling and resource recovery.

Wakool Shire Council Economic Development Strategy

Council adopted the final Wakool Shire Council Economic Development Strategy 2014-2017, which sets out actions and outcomes for economic development in the Shire. The draft strategy was previously placed on public exhibition for 28 days with no comments or submissions received.

Stormwater projects tendering

Council will advertise for Expressions of Interest as part of the selective tendering process for the supply of goods and services for storm water projects in Barham.



The projects include removal, supply and installation of pump stations, electrical installations and connections, concrete and pipe pits, and kerbing and road surface works.

Sprayed bituminous surfacing

Council accepted the tender from Primal Surfacing Pty Ltd for sprayed bituminous surfacing for three years (with the option of a two-year extension), as part of Council's road sealing program.

National Local Roads and Transport Congress

Council will send delegates to the National Local Roads and Transport Congress in Tamworth from 12 to 14 November 2014. All costs will be met by Council.

Special Rate Variation - 2015/2016

Council will begin the application process to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) for a Special Rate Variation to commence from July 2015. Public consultation sessions with ratepayers will also take place, including around proposed percentage increases. Following this consultation process, the application will be submitted to IPART by February 2015.

Recruitment and Selection Policy

Council adopted the draft Recruitment and Selection Policy, which will go on public exhibition for 28 days for comment. The policy applies to the recruitment, selection and appointment of casual, temporary, fixed term and permanent employees (except the General Manager and senior staff identified under the Local Government Act, 1993).

Customer Service Policy and Complaints Management Policy

Council adopted the draft Customer Service Policy, which applies to all requests for service and complaints made by customers in relation to Council's operation.

Council also adopted the draft Complaints Management Policy. The policy sets out effective complaint management within the organisation and applies to all Councillors, Council officers, contractors and volunteers.

The draft Customer Service Policy and Complaints Management Policy are part of the review of the entire customer service/complaints management function of Council.

Both draft policies will go on public exhibition for 28 days for comment.

Engineering operations

Council noted an information report regarding works carried out or planned in the Shire. These works include:

- Pile driving at Nacurrie North Bridge is complete as is the bridge substructure and superstructure frame. The installation of bridge decks is in progress. The bridge is expected to be commissioned by the end of September.
- Bridge pile driving is complete on Marunda Bridge, installation of headstocks is underway.
- Designs for Coolbool Island Bridge are complete.
- A number of roads have been graded around the Shire.
- Shoulder grading is being undertaken in Speewa and Koraleigh areas.
- General road patching is taking place.
- Heavy patching on MR 694 will start in late September.
- MR 94 road reconstruction will commence at the end of September and is anticipated to be finished by the end of November.
- Sewer investigations in Moulamein and Murray Downs are complete. Interflow will provide a maintenance and repair report in due course.
- The renewal of the Barham Sewer Rising Main project is ongoing.
- A tender for the Gravity Stormwater Strategy implementation is being prepared.
- Council has submitted an application to the Department of Infrastructure and Regional Development for Bridge Renewal Program funding of \$3.4 million for financial years 2015-2017.



- Council has submitted a grant application to Transport for NSW for a Fixing Country Roads grant for \$800,000.
- Noxious weeds prevention activities have been carried out, including road shoulder spraying. Rabbit control activities have also taken place.

SPECIAL RATE VARIATION CONSULTATION TO START NEXT MONTH

Wakool Shire Council will hold a series of community consultation sessions from next month regarding a proposed special rate variation in 2015/2016.

Wakool Shire Council General Manager Bruce Graham said Council felt it needed to have a conversation with the community about the proposed special rate variation and the options available.

"The freeze on indexation for Local Government Financial Assistance Grants for the next three years has resulted in a \$2.4 million cumulative impact over the next decade – a five per cent loss of revenue," Mr Graham said.

"This loss will have an effect on our existing service levels, including maintenance of rural roads, parks and gardens, roadsides and the continuation of the timber bridge replacement program. It could also potentially see the loss of some services."

The consultation sessions will present three special rate variation (SRV) scenarios:

Scenario 1

An SRV of 7% in 2015/2016 to maintain existing service levels.

Scenario 2

SRV of 7% in 2015/2016 and 2016/2017. This will maintain existing service levels and advance the replacement of three additional timber bridges. It will also negate the need to borrow money for the timber bridge replacement program.

Scenario 3

SRV of 6.67% average for three years starting in 2015/2016. This will provide the same outcomes as Scenario 2, plus the replacement of three additional timber bridges.

The option to not apply for a special rate variation will also be discussed at the consultation sessions.

"This is a scenario we will talk about with the community and how it will affect what people see on the ground in their communities, such as maintenance," Mr Graham said.

The community consultation meeting dates are:

- Tuesday, 25th November Wakool
- Wednesday, 26th November Moulamein

Week 2

- Tuesday, 2nd December Murray Downs
- Wednesday, 3rd December Tooleybuc

All meetings start at 5.30pm. Venues will be confirmed shortly.

Following the consultation sessions, a report will be presented to Council at its December meeting, where it will decide whether to continue with the special rate variation process.

If Council elects to continue with the SRV process, an application will be made to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal by the middle of February. The special rate variation would commence in July 2015.

WAKOOL SHIRE CONSIDERS SPECIAL RATE VARIATION

Wakool Shire Council will make application to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) for a special rate variation of 7% (inclusive of rate pegging) for 2015/2016.

The application to IPART follows a Special Council Meeting on the 21 January where councillors considered a special rate variation and various options.

Wakool Shire Council Mayor Neil Gorey said the special rate variation was in response to the freezing of indexation for Financial Assistance Grants over the next three years.

"Unfortunately, this freeze meant a loss of income for Council, which then affects the ability of the organisation to continue its service levels, including maintaining roads," Cr Gorey said.

He added that the proposed special rate variation would only meet existing service levels and infrastructure to some degree.

"If the application to IPART is successful, the 7% special rate variation for 2015/2016 will only maintain Council's existing service levels, there will still be a need to look at efficiencies across the organisation," he said.

"This will include a review of Council operations across the board, including the areas of engineering, finance administration and organisational development."

Cr Gorey said the special rate variation was also setting the scene for the NSW Government's Fit for the Future package, released following the Independent Local Government Review Panel's recommendations.

"As a Council, providing services to our communities and ensuring that our communities are represented is essential. We need to ensure that Council is in a good position throughout the Fit for the Future process, including pursuing Council's preferred option of becoming a Rural Council."

Community meetings regarding the special rate variation and its options were held late last year in Barham, Wakool, Moulamein, Murray Downs and Tooleybuc. More than 130 community members attended the sessions.

Council will make application to IPART for the special rate variation by the middle of February and expects a response to its application by the end of March.

If the application is successful, the 7% special rate variation would commence in July 2015.

Wakool Shire Council to pursue Rural Council option

Wakool Shire Council has resolved to pursue the option to become a Rural Council, following the Independent Local Government Review Panel's recommendations and subsequent Fit for the Future package.

The resolution, which was made at Council's October meeting, would see the Wakool Shire Council work with other similar sized councils within the Mid-Murray Group.

Wakool Shire Council General Manager, Bruce Graham said Council was opposed to mergers, but would be willing

to discuss Rural Councils and Joint Organisations.

"Council considered two important principles in its response to the Fit for the Future package – services to its communities and community representation," Mr Graham said.

"While the formation of a Rural Council will mean changes to services and operations to ensure efficiency and performance, Council remains strongly committed to ensuring residents and ratepayers receive acceptable levels of service.

"The package's alternative

proposal is for Wakool Shire Council to consider merging with Deniliquin, Conargo and Murray Shire Councils a forming a Regional Council centred in Deniliquin. This is not Council's preferred option."

Mr Graham added that Council would also seek the community's feedback regarding the options outlined in the Fit for the Future package.

"We would like to hear from our community about the option of Wakool becoming a Rural Council or the alternative of becoming a Regional Council and merging with Deniliquin, Conargo and Murray," he said.

"It's important that residents are aware of all the options outlined within the Fit for the Future package, what it potentially means for services and provide their feedback around this."

WAKOOL Shire Council will prepare a report and consult with resia report dents about a possible rate increase to start in

July next year. The report will out-line different options to compensate some of the loss of revenue following the Federal Gov-ernment's decision to freeze indexation of local government Finan-cial Assistance Grants for three years.

The rate increase will allow council to maintain expenditure on services and operations within the shire.

Wakool Shire Council general manager Bruce Graham said council would put the options to the community over the next month. He said he believed council had a "duty of care" to consult with

the community and tell residents what was going on.

"[Residents] might be happy to pay the extra and not have services cut," he said. "It potentially can go

"It potentially can go either way. "We will look at a range of different com-munication methods, including having infor-

mation packs online as well as community-meetings." He said if the com-

munity refused the rate increase, council would then have no choice but to cut services.

The consultation process follows a requirement for New South Wales local governments to consult with its residents about a possible rate increase rather than, and prior to, cutting services.

No increase in allocation


IT WAS announced this week that there would be no allocation increase in the Murray or the Murrumbidgee river systems.

WAKOOL SHIRE CONSIDERS SPECIAL RATE VARIATION

Wakool Shire Council will make application to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) for a special rate variation of 7% (inclusive of rate pegging) for 2015/2016.

The application to IPART follows a Special Council Meeting on the 21st January, where councillors considered a special rate variation and various options.

Wakool Shire Council Mayor, Neil Gorey said the special rate variation was in response to the freezing of indexation for Financial Assistance Grants over the next three years.

"Unfortunately, this freeze meant a loss of income for Council, which then affects the ability of the organisation to continue its service levels, including maintaining roads," Cr Gorey said.

He added that the proposed special rate variation would only meet existing service levels and infrastructure to some degree.

"If the application to IPART is successful, the 7% special rate variation for 2015/2016 will only maintain Council's existing service levels, there will still be a need to look at efficiencies across the organisation," he said.

"This will include a review of Council operations across the board, including the areas of engineering, finance administration and organisational development." Cr Gorey said the special rate variation was also setting the scene for the NSW Government's Fit for the Future package, released following the Independent Local Government Review Panel's recommendations.

"As a Council, providing services to our communities and ensuring that our communities are represented is essential. We need to ensure that Council is in a good position throughout the Fit for the Future process, including pursuing Council's preferred option of becoming a Rural Council."

Community meetings regarding the special rate variation and its options were held late last year in Barham, Wakool, Moulamein, Murray Downs and Tooleybuc. More than 130 community members attended the sessions.

Council will make application to IPART for the special rate variation by the middle of February and expects a response to its application by the end of March.

If the application is successful, the 7% special rate variation would commence in July 2015.

MADIGAN RALLIES LOCALS OVER MISERY DBP

More than 120 irrigators, landholders and small business people attended a public meeting in Barham last Wednesday evening (4th February), with speaker after speaker saying the Murray Darling Basin Plan was killing their region.

In a passionate and often angry series of speeches, locals expressed frustration and dismay at recent comments by the new Parliamentary Secretary for the Environment, Bob Baldwin.

Mr Baldwin has said he would not listen to broad rhetoric, asking for specifics.

But grower after grower told independent Senator for Victoria, John Madigan, who organised the meeting, that they had spent the last two years providing specific details of the impact of the MDBP on their properties

"There's a disconnect here between what we have been telling the bureaucrats and what the bureaucrats tell the politicians," one speaker said.

"The Murray Darling Basin Authority is a gravy train for snouts in the trough - and it's killing our region, killing our livelihoods and decimating Australia's food bowl."

Another speaker urged the audience to take their frustration to the ballot box.

"We keep voting people in year after year but until this area becomes a marginal seat, they will keep taking us for granted," he said.

"Unless the communities polarise themselves, get behind John Madigan and force Canberra to relook at this... you can say goodbye to this

region. "I don't know what the future holds."

Senator Madigan said he was holding a series of meetings in the region to hear first-hand the impact of the Plan.

"You can't rely on the bureaucrats," he told the audience.

"Next week, Parliament resumes and the first opportunity I get, I will give the most cracking speech on the Murray Darling Basin.

Senator Madigan urged communities to stay united in their fight. "There are people out there who

want to divide and conquer you," he said.

"They are going to try and sow seeds of doubt. You must not be distracted and you must not attack each other. You have to avoid being sucked in by the lies.

"You're in this together. United you stand and divided you fall.

"These people are manipulative but you can win this."

Senator Madigan continues his MDB trip with meetings in Mildura and Yea.

He said members of the crossbench, including Senators Ricki Muir and Nick Xenophon, were taking a keen interest in the issue and he would be updating them on developments.

Recreational fisheries have been boosted in the local area from a recent restocking by the Barham Angling Club.

The club released 4890 Murray Cod at Gee Gee Bridge on the Wakool River, on the 21st January, with the help of the 'Dollar for Dollar' stocking program by DPI Fisheries.

Club President Gary Wilkinson said that "fishing is an extremely important social pastime for many community members and the restocking will provide the base for improved fishing in the region for many years. We are already seeing a recovery in native fish in the mid to lower Wakool River since the start of the collaborative blackwater recovery program, in 2011'

"The Club is grateful to the volunteers that raised funds for the restocking through sausage sizzles, fishing competitions and raffles and to the local businesses that have contributed. We trust the recreational fishing fraternity and businesses will be rewarded with improved catch rates and tourism dollars being circulated in the region". The Barham Services Club has also just announced funding of \$1,000 for the Barham Angling Club which is great news, and will support fish restocking in the local region next season. We thank the Services Club again for their support.

section of the Edward-Wakool system. However, populations in the upper reaches of the system had remained stable. This was mainly due to the co-operation of Murray Irrigation Limited providing the use of Murray Irrigation channel escapes to supply good quality water in the upper Wakool River and create localised higher oxygen fish refuge zones, at the time of the blackwater event.

A collaborative effort involving the Edward Wakool Angling Association, local angling clubs, stocking groups, NSW DPI Fisheries and Murray Local Land Services, undertook a major stocking program to restock the effected mid to lower section of the Wakool River.

In total 119,800 Golden Perch and 59,100 Murray Cod were released at five strategic monitoring sites. It appears that these fish have indeed survived after a quick two hour fishing survey on the release day resulted in 7 cod ranging from 15cm to 52cm! The different sizes caught in the range represent the different age classes stocked and are now present in the system. The restocking program also provided an opportunity to conduct much needed research on fish restocking success rates. All fingerlings released were chemically marked with calcein to uniquely identify these fish from fish recruited naturally in the system.

recaptured and then a subsefloodwaters quent calculation of the contribution of stocking to native fish recovery efforts in the region.

To assess the success of the Wakool blackwater restocking project and give some feedback to fishing clubs on the survival rate of stocked fish, Murray LLS funded targeted sampling at the key stocking sites hoping to determine what percentage of the current population of Murray Cod and Golden Perch are either naturally recruited fish or stocked fish.

The Edward Wakool Angling Association will keep you updated on the progress of these surveys in the future.

It has been estimated in some research that normally only 3 percent of stocked fish survive after being released, however it is anticipated that there will be much higher survival rates due to the loss of likely large bodied fish from the initial fish kill event which would have acted as predators on the fingerlings.

Other stocking research has resulted in some interesting outcomes. Over a 5 year period chemically marked fish were stocked into three local rivers, the Billabong Creek, Edward River, and the Murrumbidgee River with poststocking surveys determining the proportion of marked fish.

The results showed that at least a proportion of the stocked fish survived to reach the legal minimum size in all three rivers. However, the impacts of stocking on population structure were very different among rivers.

In the Edward and Murrumbidgee Rivers, the age classes corresponding to the years of stocking were comprised of 18-38% experimen-

About the blackwater restocking program

The mid to lower Wakool River was decimated by fish kills in 2010 and 2011, when

Batch marking fish with calcein enables future identification should these fish be tally stocked fish, and these fish made only a relatively minor contribution to the total catch of Golden perch.

In contrast, stocked fish comprised up to 100% of age classes corresponding to stocking years in Billabong Creek, and stocking resulted in a four-fold increase in the catch rates of Golden Perch. This could be attributed to the restrictions to fish movement in this system.

Wakool Shire Council 2014/2015 BUDGET ADOPTED

Council adopted the 2014/2015 draft budget and Community Strategic Plan at its June Ordinary Meeting.

The budget had been amended at the May Ordinary Meeting after the Federal

Government announced a freeze on the indexation of Local Government Financial Assistance Grants for the next three years. This meant \$105,000 of revenue was removed from the 2014/2015 budget, while the effect on the 10-year Long Term

Financial Plan is a \$3.2m reduction in revenue.

Despite the freeze, Council will maintain expenditure on services and operations at the same levels as the last financial year. It will also be reviewing the organisation to find operational savings and is planning on a reduction in working capital in 2014/2015.

Council will also be starting the process for a special rate variation, to begin from the 2015/2016 financial year. This must be done through a community consultation process and application to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART).

Regardless of the announcement, Council's 2014/2015 budget still includes a number of initiatives, focusing on local roads and bridges, projects and economic development, including:

• Implementation of the accelerated timber bridge replacement program for local roads, with five timber bridges to be completed during the 2014/2015 financial year.

MAYOR'S MESSAGE

CROSS-BORDER ISSUES UP FOR DISCUSSION

The Central Murray Cross Border Forum, to be held on the 29 and 30 October, will be tackling the huge number of issues for our communities living along either side of the New South Wales-Victoria border.

The forum, which is being arranged by Wakool Shire and Deniliquin Council, will see the meeting of seven New South Wales councils and three Victorian councils, as well as federal and state government representatives. Non-government, business and community groups will also be involved in the forum.

There are some 1200 cross-border issues along the Murray, from vehicle licensing and registration, health, education, building and construction, taxes, law enforcement, and more. Post-hospital care continues to be of a major concern, while water transfers also remain a big problem.

Councils and community members are being asked to provide their concerns around cross-border issues in the lead up to the event. Further details on the forum and its program will be available later this month.

Actions from the October forum's recommendations will be included in a fiveyear strategy with planned annual forums and workshops to build on the actions from this strategy.

2014/2015 BUDGET

Despite the impact of the freeze on indexation of Financial Assistant Grants, Council's 2014/2015 budget does include a number of initiatives and projects.

As mentioned in this edition of Shire Wire, the budget has a focus on local roads and bridges, and town maintenance and construction – including the resealing program and stormwater drainage for Barham and Moulamein.

It's also great to see funding towards the scoping and planning of the Moulamein Hub and Wakool Agrifood Naturally (formerly Barham Q Centre) projects at \$50,000 each. The budget also makes provision for Council's economic development, which Council was pleased to welcome Gary Kerr as Economic Development and Tourism Manager.

Gary is already concentrating on a number of economic development initiatives within the Shire, including updating Council's economic development strategy, which the draft has been out on public exhibition. Consultation and community meetings around economic development within the Shire are also underway.

Council is committed to supporting economic development throughout our Shire and invite our business and broader communities to join us in building a resilient, growing local economy and vibrant communities.

GET READY FOR THE RETUNE!

As the final step in Australia's successful move to digital-only TV, some TV channels will be changing frequencies. These moves will free up broadcasting spectrum so that it can be used for new services such as mobile broadband.

After the channels have changed, you will need to retune your digital TV, set-top box or digital TV recorder to find the channels that have moved.

The retune will take place across Australia progressively until the end of 2014. Your retune date depends on your location and which tower you're receiving your TV signal from.

Some people within the same town or city will have different retune dates. This is because some areas may be serviced by a number of TV towers. The best way to find the retune date in your area is by entering your address into the "Get retune info" box on the website at: digitalready.gov. au/retune.

Just like the successful switch to digitalonly TV, the retune has been carefully planned to make sure the change is as easy as possible.

COUNCILLORS REDUCE ALLOWANCE

At its June meeting, Council formally elected to reduce the current Councillor allowance to the minimum payable and to freeze the Mayoral allowance at its current level for the next financial year.

The reduction of the Councillor allowance and freezing of Mayoral allowance is in recognition of the impact on Council's 2014/2015 budget following the freeze on the indexation of Local Government Financial Assistance Grants.

"The freeze on the indexation of Financial Assistance Grants had an impact of \$105,000 in revenue for Council's 2014/2015 budget," Wakool Shire Council Mayor Cr Neil Gorey said.

"In light of this impact and the resulting effect on the budget, Council felt it was only right to lower its fees to the minimum payable for the next 12 months, as well as keep the Mayoral allowance at the same level as the previous financial year."

Wandering Stock Reminders

Wakool Shire's Compliance Team are reminding local farmers of the dangers of wandering stock on public roads.

Under the Crown Lands Act 1993 it is an offence to allow stock to graze or be driven on public land due to the risks involved.

Stock wandering uncontrolled on roads and even in public places are serious hazards for both people and road traffic, particularly at night.

In a bid to eliminate this problem, Wakool Shire have invested in portable stock yards which will allow Rangers to impound animals that are found grazing in public areas.

Penalty Infringement Notices may also apply along with the associated costs of impounding.

While impoundment is necessary to ensure traffic safety and to protect the animals themselves, our Compliance Team will make every effort to work with farmers to recommend the best solutions for stock grazing.

Timber bridge replacement program underway

Wakool Shire Council's accelerated timber bridge replacement program for local roads is in progress, with works to Nacurrie Road North Bridge underway.

Approximately 52 metres long, the Nacurrie Road North Bridge is seven spans, each of which is 7.5 metres long. Forty universal column steel piles up to 20 metres deep have been installed, while a modular steel frame structure will be assembled for the superstructure below the deck. Modular precast concrete will then be installed above the steel frame structure.

The Nacurrie Road North Bridge, which is being delivered by Council staff and contractors, is expected to be finished during the next couple of months. The final stage will include works at the bridge approaches.

In addition to the Nacurrie Road North Bridge, four more bridges will be delivered during this financial year under the timber bridge replacement program.

This includes Marunda Bridge which has been excavated and is ready for pile driving, while designs for Coolbool Island Bridge are nearing completion.

Next Of Kin Program

Barham Police are inviting people living alone to register for the Next of Kin Program.

The Next of Kin Program is FREE and enables people living alone, regardless of age or disability to record their details at their local police station.

The information is entered on NSW Police Next of Kin Register and holds information of the nominated next of kin, doctors, dentists and any medical warnings which may be used to assist ambulance and police in an emergency situation. If an incident occurs that leaves them incapacitated, emergency services will be able to contact a next of kin or medical services for guidance.

The registered person is provided with a key ring and a sticker displaying their registered number to place on their phone or refrigerator to alert emergency services that they are a registered person.

Registration forms can be collected from Barham Police Station, Barham Community Health, Barham HACC office, Barham Medical Centre, and the Barham and Moulamein Council Offices. Police will arrange collection of completed registration forms from these places or forms can be returned directly to Barham Police Station.

Renewed focus on Tourism and Economic Development

Wakool Shire Council has welcomed its new Economic Development and Tourism Manager, Gary Kerr.

Gary has been involved in economic development in regional New South Wales and Queensland for around 20 years.

One of his initial tasks was updating Council's Economic Development Strategy, which sets out actions and outcomes for economic development within the Shire. The draft strategy 2014-2017 was adopted by Council at the July Ordinary Meeting.

The strategy focuses on directions identified in Council's Vision 2023 Community Strategic Plan, and six driving sectors of the Wakool Shire economy – agriculture, tourism, health and community services, education, retail and the Red Gum industry.

A further report will be presented to Council for consideration and adoption of the Economic Development Strategy, including any amendments, after the public exhibition period.

Council is certainly looking forward to the new initiatives that will emerge from this updated strategy and the economic direction it will take the Shire now and into the future.

The Moulamein and District Endless Opportunities Forum also saw around 60 community members provide feedback to Council and discuss a range of opportunities for the district.

Discussions centred on town centre revitalisation, tourism and value-added agriculture, with a range of ideas to come out of these themes. Ideas included walking and bicycle trails in town and surrounds (including along the river), town entry and promotions, and an arts and crafts theme within the central business district. The forum also identified a possible annual agriculture forum focusing on research and education.

At the time of writing, a Tooleybuc Central Business District Revitalisation Forum was due to be held on the 6 August 2014. Details on the forum and its outcomes will be in the next edition of Shire Wire, due out in mid-November.

Tooleybuc Bridge update

Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) in partnership with VicRoads, has started planning for a new bridge at Tooleybuc.

After receiving feedback from the community, three route options have been selected for further investigation. All options connect to Murray Street.

- Yellow option a high level bridge downstream of the existing bridge.
- Blue option a low level bridge with a lift span immediately next to and upstream of the existing bridge.
- Purple option a low level bridge with a lift span upstream of the existing bridge (based on the previous high level orange option).

Together with VicRoads and Wakool Shire Council, RMS are currently carrying out specialist studies around these three options. A noise and vibration assessment has been completed, while a flood modelling study and a socio-economic study are underway. RMS will also start underwater surveys and an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment around the options. A flora and fauna assessment is due to start in spring.

An urban design study will look at the landscape and the visual impact of each bridge option, and an architectural firm will be engaged regarding ideas around the old Tooleybuc Bridge, including the wharf.

Following the studies, RMS will present their results and their preferred bridge option at a community consultation session, expected to take place by March 2015.

Further details regarding the studies and the consultation session will be in the next edition of Shire Wire due out in mid-November.

Wakool Shire Council will also be working with the Tooleybuc community regarding a range of opportunities for the town around the replacement bridge, whichever option is decided.

This includes revitalising the affected section of Murray Street and keeping heritage aspects of the original bridge, such as the bridge keeper's cottage.

Council and the Tooleybuc community will identify preferred revitalisation projects and will work with Roads and Maritime Services to realise these opportunities.

The Murray River Bridge at Tooleybuc is part of the NSW Government's Bridges for Bush initiative.

Wakool's World of Works

A selected snapshot of some current projects and works by our Engineering Department...

PROJECTS

- Council is managing the replacement of the Gee Gee Bridge (currently owned by RMS). Following environmental studies, construction on the replacement bridge is anticipated to start in late 2015.
- Renewal of East Barham Road is continuing.
- A 2km section of road between Wakool and Deniliquin will be renewed.
- The Tooleybuc Water Treatment Plant upgrade is expected to start early next year. The upgrade will increase the water treatment plant's capacity.
- The next stage of the Barham Stormwater Strategy will include the renewal of pumping stations in Gonn Street, which will take place this financial year. This will be followed by the renewal of underground drainage in Punt Road (late 2015).

OTHER PROJECTS

- Sewer rehabilitation works are programmed for Moulamein and Murray Downs this financial year.
- Draft Flood Risk Plans were adopted at the June Council meeting, with the draft plans then put on public display for feedback. Flood mitigation measures from the plans will now be examined.
- MR319 Thule and Gonn Street reconstruction is complete. Water main replacement will take place along Thule Street.
- Work is complete on the erosion and retaining wall remediation in Barham by Comdain Infrastructure. Construction of a timber facade for the front of the concrete panels has commenced as part of the Better Boating Program.
- Culverts in Vinecombe Lane and Lawson Road are complete as part of the Barham Stormwater Strategy.
- Works on the Moulamein Office car park have started, with kerbing and access complete. This project involves new kerbing, footpaths, surface and landscaping.

GENERAL

- Traffic counts have been placed along Wakool Street between Thule and Mellool Street, Noorong and Niemur Street and Punt Road and Forest Street in Barham.
- Various roads have been graded throughout the Shire.
- Road sign inspections/installation has taken place.
- Road and bridge inspections are being conducted.
- Playground inspections have been carried out.

- Ongoing routine maintenance has been performed in each township of the Shire.
- Repairs and maintenance is taking place in all towns, including routine pavement patching and soft fall replacement.

GETTING FIT FOR THE FUTURE

Following the recommendations of the Independent Local

Government Review Panel, the New South Wales Government has released its Fit for the Future package.

In its response to the Independent Local Government Review Panel's recommendations and subsequent Fit for the Future package, Wakool Shire has considered two important principles – services to our communities and community representation.

Therefore, at its October meeting, Council resolved to pursue the option to become a Rural Council, which would see it work with other similar-sized councils within the Mid-Murray Group.

While the formation of a Rural Council will mean changes to services and operations to ensure efficiency and performance, Council remains strongly committed to ensuring residents and ratepayers receive acceptable levels of service.





The alternative proposed in the Government's Fit for the Future package is for Wakool Shire Council to consider merging with Deniliquin, Conargo and Murray Shire Councils to form a Regional Council centred in Deniliquin. This is not Wakool Shire Council's preferred option.

We are seeking community feedback on the option of Wakool becoming a Rural Council or the alternative of merging with Deniliquin, Conargo and Murray to form a Regional Council. Councils will now assess their current position and submit a Fit for the Future proposal by 30 June 2015.

The consultation sessions will present four scenarios:

Scenario 1

No special rate variation (SRV). This would result in a reduction of existing service levels.

Scenario 2

An SRV of 7% in 2015/2016 to maintain existing service levels.

Scenario 3

SRV of 7% in 2015/2016 and 2016/2017. This will maintain existing service levels and advance the replacement of three additional timber bridges. It will also negate the need to borrow money for the timber bridge replacement program.

Scenario 4

SRV of 6.67% average for three years starting in 2015/2016. This will provide the same outcomes as Scenario 2, plus the replacement of three additional timber bridges.

Following the consultation sessions, a report will be presented to Council at its December meeting, where it will decide whether to continue with the special rate variation process.

If Council elects to continue with the SRV process, an application will be made to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal by the middle of February. The special rate variation would commence in July 2015.

MAYOR'S MESSAGE

SPECIAL RATE VARIATION **CONSULTATION**

As outlined in this edition of Shire Wire, starting this month Council is holding a series of consultation sessions around the proposed special rate variation.

The special rate variation, which, if Council pursues the process, will come into effect in 2015/2016 and is in response to the freeze on indexation for Financial Assistance Grants for the next three years.

This freeze resulted in Council having to adjust its 2014/2015 budget and its 10-year Long Term Financial Plan. Furthermore, the loss of this income means Council's existing service levels will be effected, including maintenance on rural roads, parks and gardens and roadsides.

The consultation sessions will present four special rate variation scenarios, which you can read about in further detail in this newsletter.

It's important that our communities are informed about the special rate variation, the options and what it will mean in terms of rates and provision of services. If you are able, I urge you to attend one of these consultation sessions

FIT FOR THE FUTURE

At its October meeting, Council agreed to pursue the option to become a Rural Council as set out in the New South Wales Government's Fit for the Future program, part of Local Government reform across the

As a Rural Council, Wakool Shire will work with other similar-sized councils within Nei/Gorey MAYOR

the Mid-Murray Group. This will not only help to ensure service delivery to our communities, but will provide Wakool with a strong voice within the region.

The alternative proposed in the Government's Fit for the Future package is for Wakool Shire Council to consider merging with Deniliquin, Conargo and Murray Shire Councils to form a Regional Council centred on Deniliquin. This is not Wakool Shire Council's preferred option.

We are seeking your input on these options, which you can read about in more detail in this newsletter.

BUSINESS AND COMMUNITY THANK YOU

I would like to thank our local businesses for their involvement in the Murray Darling Basin Regional Economic Diversification Program funding applications. Council put in a number of applications to the program, as have local businesses across the Shire.

I would also like to thank our community and businesses for their input into Council's Economic Development Strategy, Economic Impact Assessment and the Wakool Agrifood Naturally feasibility study.

The resulting feedback has been extremely helpful in determining the effects on our economy of recent and past events, including water reductions. This feedback has also highlighted the resilience of our communities and the innovation of businesses, including farmers, who are diversifying and investigating different markets and business opportunities.

Economic Development update

Council's Economic Development Unit has been fairly busy during the past few months working on a number of projects.

FUNDING APPLICATIONS

Council has lodged funding applications with the Murray Darling Basin Regional Economic Diversification Fund for the Wakool Agrifood Naturally project, Wakool Community Foundation and Moulamein Community Hub.

The Wakool Agrifood Naturally summary report, presented at the October Council meeting, recommended establishing a Wakool Agrifood Naturally cluster. The cluster will benefit businesses within the Barham and broader Wakool area to generate new economic development within the local economy. The initiative aims to counteract the impacts of water cutbacks through the Murray Darling Basin Plan, reduction of the red gum timber industry, low-cost imports and the cutting of food prices among supermarket chains.

The Wakool Community Foundation is a philanthropic foundation that could potentially provide up to \$300,000 per year, every year to support community and business groups. This amount could be doubled if used to leverage other funding programs.

A series of community consultation forums held throughout the Shire saw broad support for the foundation, including maintaining and improving the liveability of communities. This is a critical factor in retaining and attracting skilled workers.

The proposed Moulamein Community Hub will be a best practice hub, co-locating Council's Business Centre, Community Health Centre, library and Home and Community Care (HACC) services, and additional business support facilities.

BARHAM CONSOLIDATED

Following its Annual General Meeting (AGM) on the 29th of October, Barham Consolidated will be increasing its role in Barham's business community. This includes coordination of a number of local business activities around networking, advocacy, business opportunities and functions. The Executive Board for the 2014/15 year is Colin Membrey (Chair), Kent Bassett (Vice-Chair), Fave Ashwin (Treasurer) and Garv Kerr (Ex-Officio secretary). The AGM also unanimously resolved to set a \$55 (including GST) membership fee for the next 12 months, which will give members access to the range of planned activities.

BROADBAND SERVICES

During November, submissions will be prepared to the National Broadband Network (NBN) and Telstra for upgrades to improve current infrastructure throughout the Shire before the NBN becomes available. The submissions will also address the need to ensure NBN coverage caters for future growth of towns and rural parts of the Shire.

A selected snapshot of some current projects and works by our Engineering Department...

PROJECTS

- Council is managing the replacement of the Gee Gee Bridge (currently owned by RMS). The bridge is currently in the conceptual design stage. Geotechnical studies will also be carried out during November. It is anticipated construction works on the bridge will start in the 2015/2016 financial year.
- The next stages of the East Barham Road renewal are commencing. The first stage is expected to be completed at the end of November, with the next stage of reconstruction works to start early in the New Year.
- Two pump stations have been replaced as part of the Barham Stormwater Strategy. The tender process for piping in Punt Road has begun, with works to start early next vear

Fruit fly and the home gardener

As we look towards summer, Council's Weeds and Environment Team would like to remind residents about their responsibilities and how to minimise the threat of the fruit fly pest.

Fruit fly attack and damage fruit and vegetables and are therefore a problem pest for home gardeners and fruit and vegetable growers

Fruit fly hosts include summer ripening fruit such as stone fruit, strawberries and apples, and vegetables such as tomatoes and capsicums. If uncontrolled, fruit flies can damage up to 100 per cent of some fruit crops.

If you grow fruit and vegetables in your home garden that fruit fly are prone to attack, you are responsible for controlling the pest.

Before starting fruit fly control, spend some time thinking about fruit fly, your situation and your garden:

- Are you prepared to control fruit fly on an ongoing basis?
- Are you willing and physically able to undertake particular control methods?
- Do vou live in an area prone to fruit fly attack and want to control the pest, or do you want to prevent fruit flies from gaining a foothold in your garden?
- What fruit and vegetables in your garden are prone to fruit fly attack?
- Do you prefer to use low impact methods rather than chemical methods?
- Do you grow large quantities of crops or small amounts?
- Can you tolerate some fruit fly damage to your fruit and vegetables?
- Do you need to grow plants that are fruit fly hosts or could you replace some with non-host plants?
- Do you own or rent where your garden is?

What can you do?

Unfortunately, there isn't a simple way to eliminate fruit fly. Instead, you need to put in place several methods to effectively control the pest. One important component in every control program is sanitation. This includes good garden hygiene practices such as picking up and destroying fallen fruit which can help break the fruit fly life cycle and prevent fruit fly numbers increasing.

Following feedback from the community. three route options have been selected for further investigation. All options connect to Murray Street.

- Yellow option a high level bridge downstream of the existing bridge.
- Blue option a low level bridge with a lift span immediately next to and upstream of the existing bridge
- Purple option a low level bridge with a lift span upstream of the existing bridge (based on the previous high level orange option)

Together with VicRoads and Wakool Shire Council, Roads and Maritime are carrying out specialist studies around these three options.

Noise and vibration and socio-economic assessments have been completed, while a flood modelling study is underway. Roads and Maritime will also carry out Aboriginal Cultural Heritage and Flora and Fauna Assessments around the options in coming weeks.

An urban design study looked at the landscape and the visual impact of each bridge option, while an architectural firm was engaged regarding ideas around the old Tooleybuc Bridge, including a potential wharf.

APPLICATION TO BE MADE FOR SPECIAL RATE VARIATION

Wakool Shire Council will make application to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) for a Special Rate Variation of 7% (inclusive of rate pegging) for 2015/2016.

The application to IPART follows a Special Council Meeting on the 21st January where councillors considered a Special Rate Variation and various options.

Wakool Shire Council Mayor Neil Gorey said the Special Rate Variation was in response to the freezing of indexation for Financial Assistance Grants over the next three years.

"Unfortunately, this freeze meant a loss of income for Council, which then affects the ability of the organisation to continue its service levels, including maintaining roads," Cr Gorey said.

He added that the proposed Special Rate Variation would only meet existing service levels and infrastructure to some degree.

"If the application to IPART is successful, the 7% Special Rate Variation for 2015/2016 will only maintain Council's existing service levels, there will still be a need to look at efficiencies across the organisation," he said.

"This will include a review of Council operations across the board, including the areas of engineering, finance administration and organisational development."

Cr Gorey said the Special Rate Variation was also setting the scene for the NSW Government's Fit for the Future package, released following the Independent Local Government Review Panel's recommendations.



Overall it was a very constructive visit and a great opportunity to inform and bring attention to the concerns facing Council and our communities, and I thank the Senator for her time.

VARIATION AND FIT FOR THE FUTURE

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank our community members for attending and provide their input at the Special Rate Variation consultation sessions held late last year.

As mentioned elsewhere in this edition of Shire Wire, following its Special Meeting in January, Council will apply to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal for a Special Rate Variation for 2015/2016 of 7% (including rate pegging). When considering the Special Rate Variation, Council was very mindful of the impacts the 14% and 20% options would have on ratepayers. However, Council was also mindful of the impact of not having a Special Rate Variation and our ability to deliver Council services to our communities. The 7% Special Rate Variation will still only enable Council to meet current service levels and infrastructure. It will not provide extra income to Council; so there will still be a need for efficiency gains throughout the whole organisation.

As highlighted in this newsletter, we have to start positioning ourselves for the Fit for the Future program. The Special Rate Variation is critical to making sure Council is in a positive position as we continue with this process.

While Council is continuing to explore all options of the Fit for the Future program, its preferred model is the Rural Council option. This would see Council work with other similar-sized councils within the Mid-Murray Group, helping ensure service delivery to communities.

Mayor Neil Gorey and Council's Economic Development Manager Gary Kerr hosted a visit to the Shire in January by Murray Darling Basin Authority (MBDA) Chief Executive Officer Rhondda Dickson, Board Member George Warne and The Living Murray Program Manager Sue Buckle.

The visit was organised to highlight the challenges the Shire is facing from environmental watering events and continuing reductions in water entitlements.

Roads and Maritime Services in partnership with VicRoads, has started planning for a new bridge at Tooleybuc.

Following feedback from the community, three route options have been selected for further investigation. All options connect to Murray Street.

- Yellow option a high level bridge downstream of the existing bridge
- Blue option a low level bridge with a lift span immediately next to and upstream of the existing bridge.
- Purple option a low level bridge with a lift span upstream of the existing bridge (based on the previous high level orange option).

Together with VicRoads, Roads and Maritime continue to carry out specialist studies around these three options.

Noise and vibration and socio-economic assessments have been completed, as has a flood modelling study, while Aboriginal Cultural Heritage and Flora and Fauna Assessments are almost complete.

An urban design study looked at the landscape and the visual impact of each bridge option. An architectural firm was also engaged regarding ideas around the old Tooleybuc Bridge, including a potential wharf.

Following the studies, Roads and Maritime will present their results and their preferred bridge option at a community consultation session, expected to take place by May 2015. A 3D 'fly-through' animation for bridge options will be available for viewing in time for the community session.

Further details regarding the studies and the consultation session will be in the next edition of Shire Wire due out in mid-May.

The Murray River Bridge at Tooleybuc is part of the NSW Government's Bridges for Bush initiative.

Club Grants available

Did you know that there is a local funding scheme available Shire wide?

ClubGRANTS is a funding scheme for community groups which allows clubs with an annual gaming revenue of over \$1 million to apply a percentage of gaming taxes to specific community projects.

Sporting Club and Murray Downs Golf and Country Club have formed links with Wakool Shire Council to decide how to allocate their funds to a wide range of causes.

Below is some useful information about the ClubGRANTS funding scheme and how you can apply.

Funding Categories

Category 1 funding applications are received by the clubs directly on an ongoing basis. Projects in the following categories qualify for Category 1 funding:

- Community welfare and social services
- Community development
- Community health services
- Employment assistance activities

Category 2 funding is for other community development and support services that are not eligible for category 1 funding (e.g. traditional areas of club expenditure, such as support for sport and recreation groups). Requests for Category 2 funding should be put in writing and include the amount requested and what it will be used for.

Wakool Shire Medicine & Allied Health Scholarship

Applications are now open for the 2015 "I'd encourage those currently enrolled in a Wakool Shire Medicine & Allied Health Scholarship Scheme.

The Scholarship is an initiative of Local Health Medical Trust and is funded and administered in partnership with Wakool Shire Council. It is designed to assist students to study undergraduate or Medicine, Nursing, postgraduate degrees in Medicine or Allied Health sciences.

Fit for the Future update

The NSW Government has acknowledged that rural communities need a new approach to local governance that recognises their unique challenges and characteristics.

Wakool Shire Council has noted the flexibility incorporated into the Rural Council template, developed for smaller councils as an optional inclusion when preparing their Fit for the Future proposals. The template, which was developed following workshops with smaller councils within NSW, recognises that one size local government model does not fit all.

Mayor Neil Gorey said Wakool Shire was keen to understand how a Rural Council might work within the context of a mid-Murray joint organisation.

"We are particularly keen to explore options for shared services and building on our Centres of Excellence approach in areas such as Planning, Building and Environmental Health, Financial Services (including payroll) and road/bridge construction," Cr Gorey said.

"Wakool Shire Council will carefully consider its options in coming months and will make its submission to Office of Local Government before the end of June 2015."

Council will continue to meet with other mid-Murray councils (Murray, Jerilderie, Deniliquin, Conargo and Berrigan Shires) and will participate in a facilitated workshop to explore all options.

The Fit for the Future package was released following a three-year independent review of local government in New South Wales.

Among the Independent Local Government Review Panel's recommendations was the consideration of councils to merge, to become a Rural Council or to establish regional Joint Organisations.
