TCorp Sustainability Review

Conducted a comprehensive, independent analysis into the financial sustainability of every council in NSW.

Local Government Infrastructure Audit

Provided information in relation to the infrastructure backlog in NSW and identified infrastructure needs by area and asset type.

Independent Local Government Review

Conducted wide consultation to develop key recommendations regarding local government structures, governance models and boundary changes. Set up in March 2012, completed in October 2013, Government released it in early 2014.

Fit for the Future – Local Government

Will lay the foundations for a stronger system of local government and stronger local communities. Released in September 2014

Local Government Acts Taskforce

Looked at ways to modernise legislation, to ensure that it would meet the future needs of councils and communities.

\$258m

To help councils who have decided to merge to make the transition and provide services and facilities communities need.

\$13m

To support local transition committees and ensure elected representatives are involved in the merger process.

\$5.3m

To get new regional Joint Organisations up and running.

\$4m

To help small councils (<10,000 population) develop innovative ways of working.

Up to \$600m

Potential savings from cheaper finance for Fit for the Future councils to invest in local infrastructure.

Up to \$100m

Reductions in red tape and duplication will save councils up to \$100m.



Expert assistance

Funding for experts to help merging councils explore the options and prepare a sound business case.

One stop shop

Access to the Office of Local Government's One Stop Shop for local government reform, including a regional relationship manager who understands your area.

Facilitators

Access to fully-funded professional facilitators who can help councils begin discussions about how to merge and the benefits for their community.

Technical support

Access to a team of technical experts to help prepare your Fit for the Future proposal.

Whats in the funding?

- \$5 million for two Councils to merge to spend on whatever the new Council likes
- Treasury report estimates the cost would be \$5.4 million for a Urana and Corowa Merger
- \$11 million for 3 Councils to merge and \$13.5 million for four Councils to merge second last report from the Independent Review Panel suggested Urana, Corowa, Jerilderie and Berrigan merge



What's in the funding?

- Funding is on the table until June 30
- Those that choose to merge, commit to this, and then have 12 months to finalise things before Sept 2016 LG elections
- Those that remain alone, commit to changes to improve scale and capacity and financial sustainability and implement prior to Sept 2016





3) What is Councils position, Are we fit for the future?

Sustainable

- 1. Break Even Operating over 3 years
 Target Result No including
 Depr'n Council = approx \$800k
 deficit (Challenge)
- 2. Own Source Rev = No, Council = approx 30%, want 60%, (Challenge)
- Spend on assets renewal = No want 100%, we are 96% (Easier to meet)



3) What is Councils position, Are we fit for the future?

Effective

- 1. Infrastructure Backlog = No, target 2% Council did estimate 12%, being reviewed, since flood and different methods
- 2. Asset Maintenance = No, approx \$800k deficit
- **3.** Debt Service Ratio = Yes, want to see debt, inter generational equity etc



3) What is Councils position, Are we fit for the future?

Efficient

1. Reduction in operating costs per capita = No, impossible for a Council with declining population, statewide measures, Rural Councils are expected to give some leniency, growing populations should produce some efficiencies



3) What is Councils position, Are we fit for the future? No

Numerous Review Panel Submissions, public meetings etc., many of us went to Corowa back in 2013 -

Final report, adopted by Government, gave Urana and 8 other Councils below 4000 population, Jerilderie, Conargo and Murrumbidgee, a Merge as the first option, (Urana's case with Corowa) OR consider a Rural Council. (not defined).

Government asked IPART to assessment criteria IPART said, (11 days) - Address Scale and Capacity before any other criteria



- 3) What is Councils position, Are we fit for the future? cont'd
- Do we have the right scale and capacity? Two things –
- Scale scale and capacity to engage effectively across community, industry and Government
- Advanced skills in strategic planning and policy development
- Effective regional collaboration
- Credibility for more effective advocacy
- Capable partner for State and Federal agencies
- Resources to cope with complex and unexpected change
- High quality political and managerial leadership GOING FORWARD WITH PRIDE



3) What is Councils position, Are we fit for the future? cont'd

What is Capacity?

- More robust revenue base and increased discretionary spending
- Scope to undertake new functions and major projects
- Ability to employ wider range of skilled staff
- Knowledge, creativity and innovation



What do we do? Merge with Corowa or submit a Stand alone application to improve?

What have we done?

- Council has met with Corowa numerous times, talked to our residents
- Council has met with the Office of Local Government
- Talked to the Minister(s), Premier(s), Local Member(s)
- Worked with REROC and RAMROC
- Attended all sessions and had strong input into the formulation of the Rural Council model





What do we do? Merge with Corowa or submit a Stand alone application to improve?

What have we done?

- Council has workshopped this many times
- Reports at every Council meeting
- Updates in our Newsletters
- Frustration in the process timing of it all
- Information about what a Rural Council is only out in February
- Methods that IPART will use only just out now
- Merger incentive money





What do we do? Merge with Corowa or submit a Stand alone application to improve? What have we done? Prior to FFF

- Council has undertaken a full org review
 Service reviews Plant, Housing, Aged Units
- Waste Management
- Zero Budget
- Asset Mgmt. review depreciation, assess condition,
- Increased our focus on Community, projects,
- Lot more to be done



Rural Council Characteristics

A council submitting a Rural Council Proposal is required to demonstrate that –

- 1. Has a small and static or declining population spread over a large area
- 2. Local economies that are based on agricultural or resource industries
- 3. High operating costs associated with a dispersed population and limited opportunities for return on investment
- 4. High importance of retaining local identity, social capital and capacity for service delivery



Rural Council Characteristics

A council submitting a Rural Council Proposal is required to demonstrate that –

- 5. Low rate base and high grant reliance
- 6. Difficulty in attracting and retaining skilled and experienced staff
- 7. Challenges in financial sustainability and provision of adequate services and

infrastructure

- 8. Long distance to a major (or sub) regional centre
- 9. Limited options for mergers.



Merge or Rural Council Choice

- Long distances between the administrative centres of adjoining councils, and to the nearest major regional centre
- Adjoining councils also have small populations and limited resources, so that an amalgamation is unlikely to offer a sustainable solution in the medium-long term
- Council concerned is presently sound and may be able to continue as a separate local government unit for some years, but it has and/or will have limited capacity to undertake the full range of local government functions.

Merge or Rural Council Choice

- Based on information, and Community informal feedback, Decision made 'in principle' to submit a 'stand-alone' Rural Council application Cr Workshop risks of merge with Corowa versus standalone, social and economic impacts would be over the longer term in the negative
- Government has not said what will happen to Councils who are NOT Fit for the Future
- Corowa (as a Council) have been very proactive towards a merger, their GOING FORWARD WITH PRIDE



Merge or Rural Council Choice – Community Consultation

- Community Engagement Strategy
- Meetings/Newsletters/Media Releases/ Facebook/Website
- Last few weeks focussed consultation
- Surveys 259 back, 92% favour standalone
- Do more analysis on those, form part of our submission
- Public Meeting last week passed a resolution to support the Council and gave Council a vote of confidence

Councils are encouraged to include other options in their proposal that will assist them in becoming Fit for the Future

Option 6 Service review

Exploring options for improved cost recovery in service provision, or optional service delivery methods



Merge or Rural Council Choice

- Range of changes proposed to identify savings and increase our revenue
- Own Source revenue 60% we are at about %30 max, need to show an improvement
- Service reviews
- Operating result \$.8m deficit including dep'n
- Depreciation \$2.4m, ordinarily balance budget exc dep'n



Merge or Rural Council Choice

- Rates and Charges \$1.76m, Fees, Investment and other income just over \$2m,
- \$4.5 million from Grants

Increasing our revenue

- Rate increases of 10% per year for the four years
- Almost all, if not all neighbouring Councils have had rebate increased approved or will be submitting both IPART applications, and including increases in their FFF applications
- Corowa 7%, 11.5%, 11.5%, 7% proposed
- Greater Hume Approx. 7% increases
- Jerilderie 10% x 4 years
