Submission from Concerned rate payers of Shoalhaven City Council

My name is Tony Blain and have lived in for the last 20 years.

I attended the Bay and Basin Forum meeting during mid Feb to debate the Council's Discussion paper regarding the application for a special rates increase by 8%.

Discussion Paper attached for you to study.

The council conduced a survey in 2009 and recently a follow up telephone survey of 180 persons in the shire.

A few of those attending the Forum meeting could not believe such a small sample was taken and be representative of the broader community.

We decided to conduct a survey on Saturday morning out side two supermarkets in the area and were surprised that such a large number of ratepayers were not aware of the huge rate rise.

We collected on that morning over 500 signatures on a petition.

Ratepayers have not had, and will be denied reasonable consultation on the matter, particularly those on fixed incomes whose situation will be worst effected.

The rate increase should be pegged at the approved 3.4% along with other councils.

This is a significant issue as the council is also looking at increasing other fees and charges on top of this rate increase.

We need the council to live within its means, and look at reducing costs and reviewing job methods.

We need to look at staffing and looking at more effective work practice.

This is before any further increase 4.6% is imposed(over and above the 3.4% already approved.

We to date over 1500 signatures and more are arriving every day.

We have also submitted a letter to ACCC for their consideration


SHOALHAVEN CITY COUNCIL

We, the undersigned, are concerned by the announcement by Shoalhaven City Council that it intends to apply for a rate increase of 8% which is 4.6% above the rate-pegging limit set by IPART. Before applying for such an increase we request that Council looks into saving money by:

- investigating the efficiency of all current council processes; and
- comparing Shoalhaven City Council's procedures with those of similar councils who are able to provide services within budget.

We are concerned too that decisions have been based on a survey with a sample size of only 180 people.

We would request that, should this application be made and be successful, further community consultation be undertaken to determine where the additional funds be spent.

'What is the person's date of birth (or age last birthday)?'



Age structure, 2011





nalysis of the service age groups of Shoalhaven City in 2011 compared to Regional NSW shows that ther roportion of people in the younger age groups (0 to 17 years) and a higher proportion of people in the older ears).

overall, 21.7% of the population was aged between 0 and 17, and 31.0% were aged 60 years and over, co nd 24.5% respectively for Regional NSW.

he major differences between the age structure of Shoalhaven City and Regional NSW were:

A larger percentage of 'Seniors' (13.6% compared to 10.3%)

A larger percentage of 'Empty nesters and retirees' (14.6% compared to 11.9%)

A smaller percentage of 'Young workforce' (8.4% compared to 10.4%)

A smaller percentage of 'Parents and homebuilders' (17.7% compared to 19.5%)

merging groups

rom 2006 to 2011, Shoalhaven City's population increased by 4,416 people (5.0%). This represents an avopulation change of 0.98% per year over the period.

he largest changes in age structure in this area between 2006 and 2011 were in the age groups:

Empty nesters and retirees (60 to 69) (+1,987 persons)

Seniors (70 to 84) (+1,311 persons)

Older workers & pre-retirees (50 to 59) (+893 persons)

Tertiary education & independence (18 to 24) (+825 persons)
