- beckons tourists
- beckons the homeless including teenagers
- has entrenched problems of drug, alcohol and mental illness
- attracts the attention of demonstrators. terrorists,
- has particular law and order and crime consequences

## **2.** For me, the wonderful thing is that the councilors and mayors have fought - within this milieu - to achieve and retain the following:

- green spaces (big and small)
- a community/village individuality and 'feel'
- community consultation
- enabling less well-off to continue living in the area
- encouraging innovative art and other cultural activities (a draw card for visitors)
- a concern for the homeless
- innovative ideas, forward thinking and action on open spaces and traffic solutions
