Supportive Submission on Pittwater's Fit for the Future (FftF) Improvement Proposal

I, as do 89% of my fellow Pittwater residents, support Pittwater's FftF proposal to stay as it is with its current boundaries.


State Government needs to take a step back and start listening and acting on the wants and needs of the people. The people's voice is an asset.

- 59% think the FftF evaluation process invalid
- 79% don't support forced amalgamation
- 65% support local govt reform
- 75% think councils should have **more** say in regional
- and capacity? Answered: 615 Skipped: 180

- 67% are satisfied or highly satisfied with their current council
- 73% think services will be compromised by amalgamation
- 75% think their council size and scale is appropriate
