

OBSERVATIONS AND COMMENTS ON ACC SURVEY

The process adopted by the ACC for this most important matter leaves much / everything to be desired

It was a lightweight, superficial technique more suited to a market research campaign for a new confectionary bar, an instant coffee variation or a fast food line.

The procedure was pathetic and lamentable and conducted by personnel not familiar with the PCC LGA and its surroundings. There was no scope for dialogue & discussion and was clearly structured and biased to produce the result now promoted by PCC in a "spin" sheet included with the 2015/2016 Rates Notice.

The decision to use a lightweight telephone survey in lieu of requesting formal submissions is, in our opinion, completely unprofessional. It creates the perception that PCC did not really desire solid and substantive feed back and that perhaps the over arching decision, ex-principle, to adopt the "ALTERNATIVE SUBMISSION" had already been taken.

The grand scheme, PCC "ALTERNATIVE SUBMISSION" / "SCENARIO A STRONG ECONOMIC REGION" which formed part of the telephone survey and submitted with PCC letter, dated Monday 22nd June 2015 to the minister and to the Chairman, has all the characteristics of the megalomania practised by the Central European powers in the late 19th - early 20th centuries. It constitutes an ambit claim for territory without thought or

consideration of the needs and desires of the PCC population not of the residents of the adjoining LGAs.

The social and economic costs and consequences of such a loose proposal have been treated superficially and inadequately. The end result, if adopted, will inevitably be a spectacular failure.

There is absolutely no logical or rational case for PCC LGA to expand east of the Main Northern Railway Line.

We repeat absolutely the PCC "ALTERNATIVE SUBMISSION" which is the thrust of "BEARING FIT FOR THE FUTURE".

SPECIFIC COMMENTS ON TELEPHONE SURVEY

The results of the Telephone Survey are distorted and flawed

1. Of the 1040 persons initially recruited 55% or 572 were unaware of the merger proposal.

These should have been automatically disqualified.

2. 601 persons or 58% of those recruited participated in the survey.

This means that,
 $2.9 < n < 330$ persons

$\frac{1}{(601 - 572)}$ (55% \times 601)
 who had no knowledge of the
 merger proposal most probably
 skewed the outcome as demonstrated
 on P84 of ACC Appendix

Of the four (4) scenarios,
 "SCENARIO 2 - NEW COUNCIL" as suggested
 by the new Government ranked
 fourth. The scope of SCENARIO 2
 was clearly defined and as such
 was / is a "COMPLETE KNOWN" but
 40% of respondents ranked it less
 acceptable than "SCENARIO 4 - A
 STRONG ECONOMIC POSITION."

SCENARIO 4 was a "COMPLETE UNKNOWN", not defined nor was it
 supported by any detail whatever.
 It embraces all of the last ranked
 SCENARIO 2 and much much more.

SCENARIO 4 ranked as first
 preference with twice the number
 of respondents compared with

SCENARIO 2 — 30% to 15%.

Combined first and second preferences for "UNKNOWN" SCENARIO 4 totaled 50% of respondents with corresponding support for "Known" SCENARIO 2 at 35%!

Such results do not reflect favourably on the PCC/METACER methodology nor on the validity of the survey.

I would refer to the following

- your undated "DEAR RESIDENT" circular letter, post marked April 28, 2015 and received May 01, 2015 with leaflet under the above heading,
- telephone survey 16.30th May 05, 2015 conducted by Opinion canvasser MACHOMA of the Central Coast

SUMMARY

My response to the four(4) presented scenarios is summarised as follows:-

SCENARIO 1

Supported without equivocation

SCENARIO 2

Rejected absolutely.

SCENARIO 3

Supported with qualification.

SCENARIO 4

Rejected absolutely.

Further, I submit three

(3) additional SCENARIOS:-

ALTERNATIVE SCENARIO 2ALTERNATIVE SCENARIO 4ADDITIONAL SCENARIO 5SUBMISSION

As a responsible long term
owner and resident of PCC I
now make the following
submission.

SCENARIO 1

SUPPORTED, without equivocation.

SCENARIO 2

REJECTED absolutely.

I do not support any merger with Holroyd and Auburn Councils

The culture, character, philosophy and demography of Holroyd and Auburn LGAs bears little in common with the ACC and would not strengthen nor enhance ACC in any way.

ACC may not be the most efficient and user friendly LGA in NSW, but its performance will not improve by adding the lowest performing, diverse and inefficient adjoining LGAs with their long standing issues and problems.

The comparatively weak Holroyd and Auburn LGAs will not be strengthened by merging with and impacting on the relatively decently performing ACC. The combined result will be reduced services, less responsive local government with a bigger bureaucracy, lower efficiency and higher costs.

ALTERNATIVE SCENARIO 2

Cede Woodville Ward, formerly Granville Ward and, prior to

February 10, 1950, the Municipality of Granville to a merged Holroyd - Auburn Council

Incorporate its western third of Ryde LGA and the North Parramatta Area of the Hills LGA with SCC

SCENARIO 3

SUPPORTED on clear understanding that "minor geographic boundary changes" and "removal of current anomalies" are, in fact what is really meant and embraced by SCENARIO 3.

SCENARIO 4

I assume that this is the "new larger council area to reflect the future role of the Parramatta region in greater Sydney."

In your leaflet it is surprisingly presented without reference to proposed boundaries. There are no tangible facts or details to assess the accompanying non-specific, vague generalities and motherhood statements.

It is not apparent whether the State government is supportive or a silent motivator for this ACC initiated proposal.

It does however bring into question the integrity and transparency of the total process.

REJECTED absolutely.

ALTERNATIVE SCENARIO 4,

Incorporate the compatible and complementary northern area of Auburn Council with ACC.

Boundaries as follows:-

NORTH	BOUNDARY	- PARRAMOTTA RIVER
SOUTH EAST	"	- HOMEBUSH BAY DRIVE
SOUTH	"	- M4 MOTORWAY
EAST	"	- HOMEBUSH BAY & POWELL'S CREEK
WEST	"	- DUCK RIVER.

Incorporation of Silverwater, Newington, Homebush Bay and the developing business district of Olympic Park would be synergistic with the current development of the ACC CBD.

It would produce the "BIG PICTURE" PCC at the demographic centre of the Sydney Metropolitan Area.

COMBINED ALTERNATIVE 2 SCENARIO AND ALTERNATIVE 4 SCENARIO

This would result in an enhanced PCC with clearly defined boundaries and would anchor PCC as the economic centre of Western Sydney with focus PCC CBD in the west and the Olympic Park CBD in the east.

A strengthened and expanded PC without the distractions, problems, demands and inefficiencies of Holroyd and Auburn would ensure the long term sustainability of PCC in the Central Western region of Greater Sydney.

ADDITIONAL SCENARIO 5:

If the State Government is concerned about the long term economic viability and sustainability of Holroyd and Auburn LGAs then consider merging these two

compatible entities with Woodville Ward (ex ACC) and the adjoining Bankstown LGA and/or Fairfield LGA to the south.

With or without merging Holroyd - Woodville Ward - Auburn with their southern neighbour(s) SCENARIO 5 would provide "CLEAR OWNERSHIP" of the vital Parramatta Road corridor from Woodville Road to Centenary Drive

Further, with its high density, high rise developments now high consideration in Pendle Hill, Wentworthville and Menai lands the cash flow position of Holroyd should be assured IF proper governance is in place

PREFERRED SCENARIO - SHORT TERM.

If in fact ACC can demonstrate that the status quo can be sustained then I support unequivocally SCENARIO 1 combined with SCENARIO 3.

PREFERRED SCENARIO - LONG TERM.

For a long term solution which I favours over a short term solution, I submit my proposed ALTERNATIVE 2 SCENARIO combined with my ALTERNATIVE 4 SCENARIO.

REJECTED SCENARIOS

Proposed SCENARIO 2 and Proposed SCENARIO 4, either singly or in combination, is REJECTED absolutely.

THE ECONOMIC & SOCIAL CASE FOR MERGING COUNCILS

The case for merging councils has NOT been made nor enunciated.

Such a proposal was initiated and subsequently abandoned by the Socialist CARR-EGAN government as an adjunct to Urban Consolidation in the 1980's to facilitate control over a lesser number of recalcitrant independent LGA's vis-a-vis the planning process.

With recent legislation, real planning controls for significant development rest with the State government anyway!

FINANCIAL INCENTIVE TO MERGE

If the State Treasurers can indeed support expenditure of \$1.0 billion as an endowment to merge then it would be socially more responsible to use the funds as a down payment on much needed new water storage dams to support the burgeoning population of Sydney and its East Coast of NSW.

Expenditure on much needed fundamental infrastructure is the preferred alternative to dissipating finite wealth pursuing SOCIAL ENGINEERING PHILOSOPHY of more centralized control of LOCAL government.

Historically, central control of public administration does not produce better outcomes, greater efficiencies and lower costs as demonstrated by the performance of the European Union (EU) and the CARB-ELAN-REFSHAUER driven mergers of the electrical supply authorities in NSW.

I would ask you please to acknowledge receipt in writing, and confirm that this submission has been placed on the public record and will be included in the PCC submission to the INDEPENDENT LOCAL GOVERNMENT REVIEW PANEL in June 2015.
