The idea that these increases go "beyond what seems justifiable by standard CPI or inflation measures" is a polite understatement. It suggests a fundamental disconnect from the lived experience of families whose budgets are already in crisis. If CPI and inflation are meant to reflect the general increase in costs, then any additional, substantial price escalation represents a real-terms decrease in household disposable income. This isn't just an adjustment; it's a profound cut to the standard of living for every single resident. We urge IPART to seriously and empathetically reconsider these proposed price increases. Your role is not merely to facilitate the financial interests of a utility provider, but to balance those interests against the fundamental right of every citizen to affordable access to essential services. A genuinely responsible approach would prioritize safeguarding households from further financial distress, ensuring that any adjustments are strictly limited to verified, efficient cost increases, truly aligned with, and ideally below, current inflation rates. To push forward with increases that will push more families into debt, hardship, and despair would be a dereliction of that critical duty. The people of New South Wales deserve transparent, accountable, and genuinely affordable utility pricing. We implore you to stand with the community, not against it, in these trying times.
