Variation in Port Stephens council rates

Please be advised that we are hereby registering our objection to the Port Stephens council proposed rate increase. If approved, this increase would mean '7.5%pa (incl the rate peg.) over 7 years, to be a permanent increase which will be retained within the rate base'

For us as pensioners, this increase would not be financially possible; our annual pension increase nowhere meets this rate increase. 2 years ago we built a home at Seaside Fern Bay, a home for our retirement. At 73 years of age, I have been working 2 days a week to purchase needed fittings for the house. Last week, due to my inability to keep working, I retired and my wife and I will go onto the full pension. A rate increase would mean me having to go back to work (or my 70yr old wife finding work) or sell the house.

Besides paying council rates, we pay a levy on our estate. During the past 2 years, apart from the council replacing a street sign, we haven't seen the council make any improvements, or maintain any of our parks or streets. Currently there are over 600 homes on this estate. That's a substantial amount of income via rates for Port Stephens.

To make matters worse, when we lived on the Central Coast, Wyong Council provided three bins for each household - 2 emptied each week. Port Stephens council doesn't even give us this service....they provide 2 bins: 1 bin emptied 1 week and 2 bins emptied on the alternate week.

Wyong Council gave the ratepayers 6 kerbside collections each year; Port Stephens council offers us 2 per year.

We appreciate you 'hearing' us out
