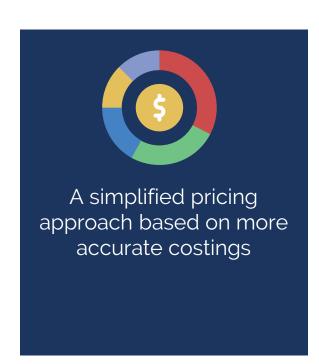
Estimating efficient cost components as building blocks

e.g. casework costs, admin costs, costs of caring

Changes to support carers to continue caring





Funding to be more costreflective for Aboriginal children in care

Draft recommendation – fortnightly care allowance (\$2024-25)

Age bracket	Current standard care allowance	Proposed standard care allowance
0-4	581	698
5-13	656	789
14-15	880	1,109
16-17	586 (plus TEP and Youth Allowance if eligible)	1,083

Note: our recommended care allowance for 16–17-year-olds makes no adjustment to account for the Teenage Education Payment (TEP) or Youth Allowance which some 16–17-year-olds may be eligible for.

Draft recommendations to support carers



Reimbursement of actuals for out-of-pocket costs for medical, dental, well being and family connections



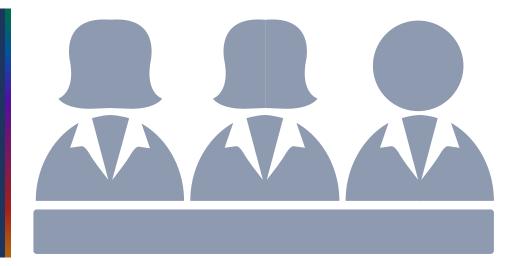
A set up payment available to carers when a placement commences



Transparent and clear guidelines on what financial support is available and how to get it



DCJ to consider centralising payment of the care allowance to all carers Feedback & Discussion 1



Draft casework findings



Complex relationship between caseload and short-term measurable outcomes



Rates of pay and conditions differ between DCJ and nongovernment providers



Casework analysis

Baseline cost

by placement type



Additional loadings

for some children with additional casework needs

Proposed caseloads and cost by placement type

Placement type	Proposed caseload	Resulting cost
Home-based care	12	\$15,200
Residential care	6	\$27,150
Supported independent living	10	\$17,310
Therapeutic independent living	8	\$20,960
Emergency arrangements	Same as previous placement, or 12 if entering care	-
Not in placement	Same as previous placement	-

Additional casework loadings*



Aboriginal children

\$2,630 for non-government providers

\$3,280 for DCJ



Restoration and permanency case plan goal

\$14,000 for non-government providers

\$15,230 for DCJ



Children with a CALD background

\$1,260 for non-government providers

\$1,440 for DCJ

Note: Differences in cost between non-government providers and DCJ are due to different labour Awards

Administration and overheads



Administrative costs vary by placement type on a dollar per child basis



Reported admin costs varied materially



Admin expenditure is significantly higher than assumed under the PSP



Care for Aboriginal children and ACCOs



Aboriginal cultural planning and cultural connections

Upfront \$6,700 Ongoing \$4,380 pa

Based on casework, cultural workers and cultural programs



ACCO-specific pricing

Additional \$6,820 per child per year when child placed with ACCO

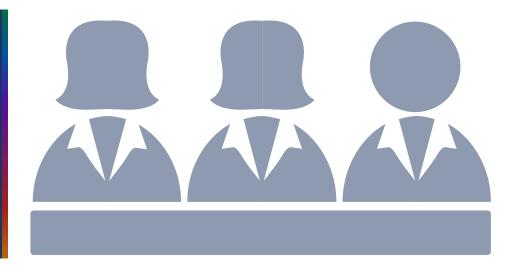
Based on administrative cost differences



Transitions

\$21,300 per initiated transition

Based on casework and admin leadup cost, as well as carer assessment and training Feedback & Discussion 2



Home-based care – cost components



Provider costs

Casework, carer recruitment and assessment, carer training, insurance and admin

Based on needs of the child

Aboriginal cultural support, CALD support, restoration and permanency



Carers

Care allowance, respite care, reimbursement of medical and therapeutic costs, set up costs

Based on needs of the child

High needs care allowance

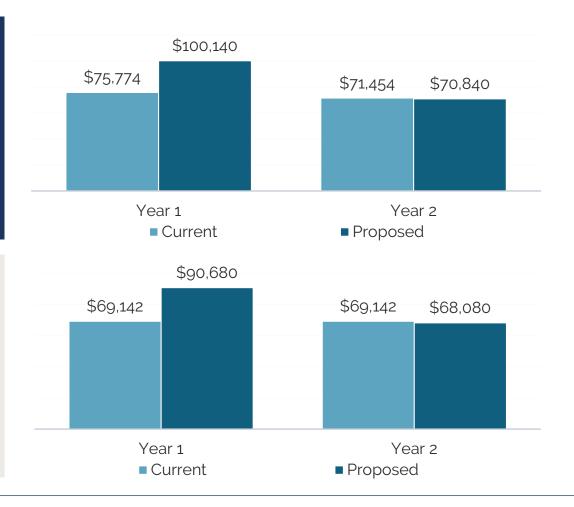
Home-based care - Example pricing scenarios using benchmarks

Home-based care

Aboriginal child, low needs, aged 5-13 with ACCO

Home-based care

Non-Aboriginal child, low needs, aged 14-15 with nongovernment provider



Residential care – cost components



House related costs

Less likely to change with vacancies (e.g. rent, maintenance, some staffing and utilities)



House establishment

Periodic house establishment costs or as agreed.



Residential care - Proposed pricing structure



Consistent with current funding, our proposed payment structure reweights some **house** related **costs** into child payments



Residential care

(2 bed; 40% active nights; aged 14-15)

Residential care

(4 bed; 100% active nights, Aged 14-15)

Residential care - Maximum pricing scenarios using proposed funding structure



Independent living – cost components



Provider costs

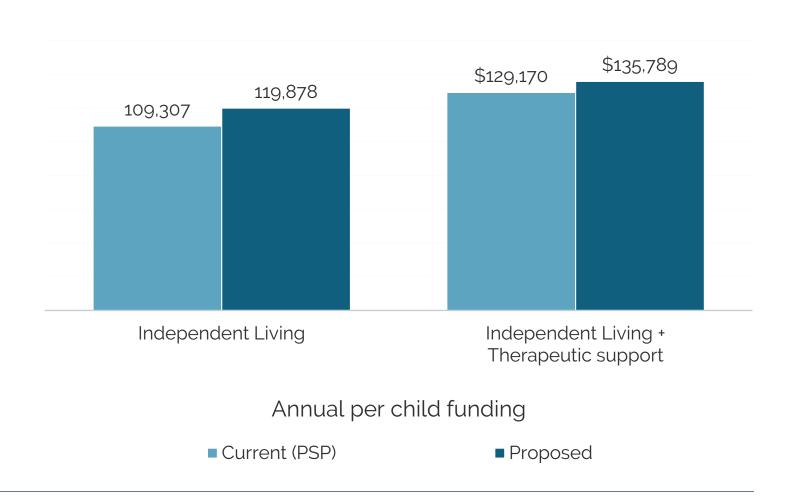
Casework, care staff, administrative costs, rent, housing running costs, day-to-day living expenses, one-off establishment costs, medical and therapeutic costs

Based on needs of the child

Therapeutic specialist, Aboriginal cultural support, CALD support

Independent Living - benchmarks and proposed pricing





Emergency arrangements – cost components



House related costs incurred by emergency arrangement provider

Rent, house running costs, care staff and other house staffing costs, one-off house establishment costs



Child related costs incurred by emergency arrangement provider

Day-to-day living expenses, medical and therapeutic costs, administrative costs



Casework related costs incurred by primary provider

Casework plus Aboriginal cultural support, restoration and permanency and CALD support if applicable

Emergency arrangements – Example pricing scenarios using proposed benchmarks

Interim Care Model

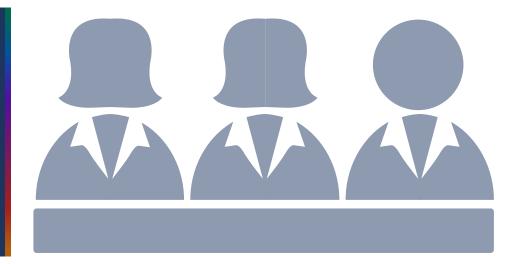
(per 4-bed house; 40% active nights; aged 14-15)

Short-Term Emergency Placement

(per child; aged 16-17)
