Rate rise to cost \$2 extra a week

MAYOR OPPOSES CASH GRAB

THE average resident in the Campbelltown region could fork out an extra \$2 a week in rates during 2014-2015 under the council's proposed 11 per cent rate variation.

Director of business services Michael Sewell said Campbelltown Council needed to apply for a variation higher than the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IP-ART) recommendation of 65c a week in order to manage its infrastructure.

"The additional money ... will be used solely for managing existing infrastrucincluding capital renewal and ongoing maintenance of community assets such as public buildings and amenities, roads, bridges, parks and facilities," he

"By increasing the rates by 11 per cent rather than adopting only the annual increase set by IPART, an additional \$5.2 million in revenue will be generated."

Campbelltown Mayor Clinton Mead said the council had a \$29 million infrastructure backlog, but he believed there were other ways to raise the funds rather than slugging residents.

"I think there is a bit of fat in the budget we can cut and we should have a look at it," he said. "If we look at the big picture we could really save some money, without affecting services.'



COUNCIL WELCOMES RESIDENT FEEDBACK ON PROPOSED HIKES

RESIDENTS are urged to speak up about a proposed 11 per cent rate rise for the 2014-2015 financial year.

Last week the Chronicle reported the average ratepayer would fork out an extra \$2 per week under the proposed rate variation.

Campbelltown councillors emphasised the need for

the rate variation and encouraged people to have a say. "This proposal is about securing the long-term viability of our assets, which is fundamental for our city's future - and we want to hear from our residents on what's important to them," Deputy Mayor Paul Lake said.

Kolkman said the rate variation was needed to reduce the maintenance and infrastructure backlog.

He said privatising services such as childcare centres and public pools was not the

Labor Councillor Rudi backlog worth \$28 million," he said. "If we do nothing about fixing that, within 10 years it will be \$88 million and ... we are creating a massive debt for the future."

Liberal Cr Paul Hawker agreed it was unwise to cut services in the region "for the sake of a few dollars".

"Over the past six to eight years we should have really been putting our rates up by a small amount each year to increase the rate base," he



Council spending provokes dispute

MAYOR Clinton Mead has been accused of using Campbelltown Council's chamber to push Liberal Democrats ideology.

Cr Mead used a mayoral minute to highlight the amount of money the council spends to subsidise local long day care centres at last week's meeting.

He has previously raised eyebrows for suggesting the council withdraw services including childcare centres, pools and leisure centres to save costs.

Cr Mead said many Campbelltown families

received federal childcare rebate, which refunded 50 per cent of costs, but the council did

Councillors said his comments should have been made in a different setting.

Deputy mayor Paul Lake said councillors had already voted down a similar proposal put forward by Cr Mead, 13-1.

"This council voted to go in a particular direction. Personally I get the impression you're trying to work against what the council has decided," Cr Lake said

"I hope that not next

MORE than 600 kilograms of dried fruit, hundreds of eggs, boxes of fresh oranges, more than 80 bottles of brandy and countless bags of flour and bread crumbs.

That's the shopping list for more than 1500 Christmas puddings which will be the result of Campbelltown Uniting Church's annual baking drive.

- Church members have been stirring up their fruit-studded creations since 1982 to support UnitingCare social outreach.

The puddings will benefit The Cottage Centre, Stepping Stone, Hurley House, Focus on Families and the Literacy Centre.

Project co-ordinator Bob Bee holds the first Christmas pudding meeting in March, and then nuts out a timeline for their creation. Cook Dianne Williams then leads about 25 church volunteers in wet-mix and dry-mix teams from July to October.

The traditional pudding recipe has been a well-guarded secret, and most helpers see only half the recipe at a time.

Mrs Williams said the time spent cooking the puddings was all about friendship.

"It's just a lovely time of catching up and getting to know people."

■ The puddings are available from Campbelltown Uniting Church, 8 Allman Street, Campbelltown from 9am to midday, Tuesday to Friday. They will be sold until December 20, or until they run out.

They can also be bought at Macarthur Square, Level 2, near ANZ Bank and Travelworld, on Thursdays and Saturdays to December 21.

The puddings cost \$33 for 1.5 kilograms, \$25 for 1 kilogram and \$14 for 500 grams.

RESIDENTS have been urged to have their say about Campbelltown Council's proposed rate rise, which could see ratepayers pay about \$2 more a week.

fundamental for our city's future," Cr Lake


The council seeks to apply for a subsidised loan of \$10 million from the state government to address priority infrastructure renewal projects in the short term.





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\$2 rate rise: have your say

THERE is still time to have your say about Campbelltown Council's proposed rate rise, which could see ratepayers pay about \$2 more a week.

The council has proposed to apply to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal for a special rate variation of 11 per cent for next year. It would mean ratepayers would pay an average of \$108 more during the 2014-15 financial year.

Deputy mayor Paul Lake said the one-off increase would help the council maintain infrastructure such as roads, parks, playing fields, facilities and recreational areas.

"This proposal is about securing the longterm viability of our assets, which is fundamental for our city's future," Cr Lake said.

The council seeks to apply for a subsidised loan of \$10 million from the state government to address priority infrastructure renewal projects in the short term.

It will also conduct a review of its services.

December 9.

That guarantee was repeated by Mr Matheson yesterday. He said: "We are honouring our election commitment and every school in Macarthur will receive the same amount of Commonwealth funding as promised."

Werriwa Labor MP Laurie Ferguson said Gonski funding would deliver more funds to disadvantaged schools, many of which were in Sydney's south west.

However, he was concerned the Coalition's agreement did not contain the same mandate for matched funding from states.

Campbelltown Liberal MP Bryan Doyle said he had been confident the contract would be honoured.

Macquarie Fields Labor MP Andrew McDonald said the bulk of the spending in the Gonski agreement was set for years five and six — beyond the Coalition's funding pledge to 2016-17.

"Abbott's clearly under advice to kill the issue politically, but clearly they've got a problem with the concept of needsbased funding," Dr McDonald said.

Catholic schools in Macarthur say they are pleased to receive assurances their funding will be secured beyond 2014.

Tim Gilmour from the Catholic Education Office Wollongong Diocese, which covers Campbelltown, said the state government's funding arrangement with the previous Labor government was binding.

"We educate one in five students nationally and in Macarthur it's more — one in four and a half — so any change in funding must be considered very carefully because we cannot be worse off," Mr Gilmour said.

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

Rates rise in the works

CAMPBELLTOWN Council has endorsed an 11 per cent rate rise, which will help it address a growing infrastructure backlog.

The Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) will now consider the council's application for the rise, with a decision expected mid-year.

A majority of councillors voted in favour of the rate variation at last week's meeting, with Liberal Demo-

continuing to oppose the move. Labor councillors George Brticevic, Wal Glynn, and Meg Oates, who last year supported the increase, voted against the move.

A report detailing the community consultation period findings suggested nearly 58 per cent of survey respondents were "very supportive" of the variation.

Cr Mead said he believed

crat Mayor Clinton Mead the council should make cuts and reallocate funds more effectively to address the infrastructure backlog rather than increase rates.

"There seems to be a claim here that we don't want to make cuts, but we have already made cuts ... with our infrastructure and that's why we are behind," he said

He also claimed the telephone survey carried out during the consultation was

biased, stating in his mayoral minute the process "was not set up to consult ratepayers, but rather to convince them to support the rate increase".

Liberal Councillor Paul Hawker, a member of the council's Corporate Governance Committee, said the increase was needed to fund infrastructure projects in the region.

"I think we will see from

July 1, if IPART agrees with it, many improvements around Campbelltown," he said. "The money is going to be used for infrastructure across the LGA which means community halls,

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Claymore reborn

\$6m injection of funds set to develop housing

By Megan Gorrey

THE state government will inject \$6 million into Claymore and introduce a mix of public and private housing in an effort to bring the neglected suburb back to life.

The two-pronged approach would improve existing public housing in the estate and open up 200 vacant land blocks for young families and firsthome owners, Community Services Minister Pru Goward said this week.

It would also reduce the concentration of disadvantage in the suburb.

"In the 1960s and 1970s when estates like Claymore were built, they mainly helped working families to get on their feet with a temporary, low-cost home," Ms Goward said.

"Today, with more than 90 per cent of public housing tenants relying on welfare we are inviting working families back in to help transform the area."

Residents have long been frustrated by delays to the Claymore Renewal Project which was announced in 2010 but stalled in September 2012 after 100 homes were demolished.

after 100 homes were demolished.


Camden MP Chris Patterson — whose seat includes Claymore until the 2015 state election when it rejoins the Campbelltown electorate — acknowledged the funding was not a "silver bullet" and there was a long way to go to get the suburb back on track.

"This will allow them to tidy up the open space, get rid of dilapidated homes and improve the look and amenity of the area," he said.

Campbelltown MP Bryan Doyle said the funds were enough for a good start.

"Claymore is strategically located close to the Campbelltown CBD and it should be a vibrant, bustling precinct," Mr Doyle said.

Campbelltown mayor Clinton Mead said: "I think the government acknowledged that public housing, with all its intentions when they started, hasn't worked out the way it was planned."

A development application will be lodged with Campbelltown Council to see stages 1 and 2 prepared for sale. The plans go on show for feedback.

CAMPBELLTOWN residents are a step closer to having to fork out for an 11 per cent rate rise.

The majority of councillors supported the proposed fee hike at last week's council meeting

This was in spite of mayor Clinton
Mead's very public campaign against
the rate rise in recent months.

He slammed the council's public consultation process for the proposed rate rise as biased and one-sided in a mayoral minute tabled at the meeting.

Cr Mead favoured a review and cuts to services over a rate rise.

However, the council said the rate rise is necessary to maintain local services, facilities and infrastructure.

In a surprise move, Labor councillors George Brticevic, Meg Oates and Wal Glynn joined Cr Mead in voting against the rate rise, despite early support for it.

They were beaten 8-4, after Liberal and independent councillors backed the rise.

The council will now apply to the Independent Pricing and Regulation Tribunal (IPART) for the rate variation by February 24.

IPART will make a determination in June, which will then come back to the council for a final vote.

If approved, the rate rise would be effective from July this year.





Trouble beneath the pretty drawings

The artist's drawings of the Claymore renewal look good, but they are misleading.

The number of homes in Claymore will be increased and the overall number of established trees and open spaces will shrink significantly.

Claymore needs to be revamped, and some trees and open space will have to go. But they plan to remove at least 90 per cent of the large reserve along Badgally Road (opposite Blairmount Public School) with its "legislatively protected" Cumberland Plain woodland so they can squeeze in as many tiny homes as they can. The only other natural parkland will be a tree-lined ditch right at the other end of Claymore, backing onto Eagle Vale.

Macarthur's green spaces within our urban areas are disappearing — thanks to UrbanGrowth (Landcom). Check out Minto to see what I mean: every tree has been razed to the ground in the latest redevelopment stage.

We need to hang onto our fast-disappearing established green spaces in Macarthur, not for just us, but for our children and our unique wildlife. Let our MPs know your sentiments.

Cut costs first

I attended the first of the community forums to discuss Campbelltown Council's proposed 11 per cent rate rise, and several issues became quite obvious.

Firstly, the council is facing a revenue shortfall, and in order to maintain and improve its infrastructure, needs additional revenue.

Secondly, in order to apply to for a rate increase above the usual 2 to 3 per cent annual increase, the council must use the term "one-off". This is definitely not a "one-off" increase.

If your annual rates are, say, \$1000 for 2013-14, then a "normal" 3 per cent annual increase would mean that your rates would increase to \$1030 in 2014-15, \$1061 in 2015-16, \$1093 in 2016-17, etcetera.

Now, if the 11 per cent increase is approved, then your annual rates of \$1000 in 2013-14 would increase to \$1110 in 2014-15, after which your rates would increase by the "normal" 3 per cent annually, therefore being \$1143 in 2015-16, \$1178 in 2016-17, testers.

So, due to the 11 per cent change in the rate base, the increase above the "normal" 3 per cent is about 7¾ per cent every year.

We do not want any reduction in council services, but we do want firm evidence of waste reduction, cost control, and cost cutting where necessary.

Go ahead with the rate increase, but only after all other possibilities have been evaluated and acted upon.







Mead gag bid fails

The mayor will not be gagged from criticising his own council - as local debate continues over 11 per cent rate rise. Jeff McGill reports.

A LABOR attempt to stop mayor Clinton Mead (pictured) bagging Campbelltown Council failed at last

Cr Mead has criticised his own council at public meetings, in the news media and online in social media and his personal blog. The Labor motion said the


mayor could still voice his opinions — but only as a councillor and "may not use the title of the mayor in any way in that process'

when several other independents, and the Liberal councillors, refused to support the motion.

Liberal Paul Hawker supported the rate rise but said he didn't agree with "gagging" Cr Mead.

"He is spokesperson for the council - but he doesn't have to be out

there saying things he doesn't believe in," Cr Hawker said. Cr Bob Thompson (independent)

said he also disagreed with the mayor — "but there's no way I can support this".

In defending his actions, Cr Mead delivered a long speech about taxation and the nation's debt burden, to which Cr Wal Glynn (Labor) asked to know Cr Mead's economic qualifications. A HSC economics course, the mayor replied.

Cr Thompson also expressed his anger at Labor councillors who he said had openly supported the need for a rate rise, then cynically voted against it in the chamber.

The ALP knew the rate rise had enough support among councillors to be approved without them, so they voted against it - so they can tell voters at the next election that they opposed it," he said.

Rate increase now being assessed

THE Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) has begun assessment of Campbelltown Council's application to increase rates by 11 per cent from July 1.

As well as the rate peg for 2014-15 of 2.3 per cent, Campbelltown Council has applied for a special variation to increase general income by 11 per cent from July 1 - and to maintain this increase permanently.

IPART chairman Peter Boxall said assessment criteria would include demonstrating a need for, and the purpose of, the additional cash flow and evidence that local ratepayers were engaged and aware of the rate rise.

'They need to show that they have listened to the input they have received, weighed up

community concerns against alternatives to the increases sought, and that they have considered the impact on ratepayers," Dr Boxall said. "We are also weighing up the applications against the costs savings councils are making to reduce the need for increases above the rate peg."

IPART should make a determination in June, which will then come back to the council for a

wealthy residents to pay much lower rates than counterpart suburbs in western and south western Sydney. Sydney outskirt suburbs are reportedly paying double in rates compared with apartments in the affluent inner city.

Federal grant money is apparently denied to the neediest places, according to a recent NSW Independent Local Government Review Panel report.

I understand that rates are calculated on land value yet, residents with harbour views on property blocks worth \$1 million apparently pay an average of \$1000 a year on rates, while a \$230,000 property in Penrith is levied about \$957.
