1 Executive Summary

The response to the exhibited Coffs Harbour City Centre Master Plan 2031 (also known as the City Centre Master Plan and Regional Skate Plaza/Youth Space Concept Plan proposal) has been significant. Over 90% of submissions support the master plan, with 195 formal submissions (emails and letters) yielding 960 unique comments (points, objections, supporting comments, and requests) plus 137 posts on the official exhibition website www.coffscity.com.au.

Since September 2012 Council has been working with the community, the master plan working group and urban design specialists to create a draft plan that aims to reposition the city centre as a 21st century city that attracts investment, new business, new residents and is also the centre of cultural life and events.

The Coffs Harbour City Centre Master Plan 2031 proposal went on public exhibition from 14 December 2012 to 28 January 2013. The timeframe has been set by State Government timelines in relation to making an application for the continuance of the CBD Special Rate that will provide the foundation funding for the improvements proposed in the Draft CBD Master Plan.

The City Centre Master Plan and Regional Skate Plaza/Youth Space Concept Plan proposals were made available for viewing at the Coffs Harbour City Council Chambers, the Coffs Harbour, Sawtell and Woolgoolga libraries and on the website at www.coffscity.com.au.

In addition, a community workshop in conjunction with the 'Coffs Harbour Think Tank' was held on Thursday, 17 January 2013 at 2.00pm in the Rainbow Room at Coffs C.ex Club.

The exhibited plans attracted over 960 submissions, with 78% supporting all or various components of the plan, 9% opposing all or various components of the plan; the remaining submissions made suggestions to the plan. In addition, the website attracted 137 posts, the majority of which were supporting.

In summary:

- Ten strategies and 12 projects were exhibited; items within projects attracted the most submissions
- The CBD strategies and projects attracted 822 unique comments (points) and web
 posts, these were made up of 625 supportive comments 88 objections and 109
 requests
- Brelsford Park attracted 196 unique comments (points), these were made up of 148 supportive comments, 29 neutral comments or requests and 19 opposing comments, plus 75 web posts of which the majority were in support of the skate park or made design specific requests.

Overall the master plan has been widely supported with 748 supporting comments in comparison with 86 opposing comments.

- Most of the submissions received supported all or various elements of the exhibited plan
- The majority of objections were directed to specific elements within the plans and are incorporated in the following sections of this report
- Often requests or comments neither supported nor rejected aspects of the exhibited plan
- Several submissions identified funding as a potential issue.

The most mentioned items within the exhibited plan (strategies and projects), were

- The Brelsford Park project (including the Skate Park Concept Plan)
- The City Square Cultural Building project was the second most popular exhibited item, with 172 unique comments, of which 139 supported, eight opposed and 25 made requests, and
- The City Square project was the third most popular item yielding 165 unique comments, made up of 139 supporting submissions, 25 requests and one opposing submission.

Objections centred on:

- Brelsford Park. Albeit small in comparison to the supporting submissions, concerns
 raised about Brelsford Park were consistently about safety issues with the Skate Plaza
 being planned too close to busy traffic and requests the youth destinations be located
 to the Jetty
- Parking issues focused on the inconveniences any reduction and / or relocations would cause, particularly for the ageing population.

Due to the significant response to Brelsford Park, the following community findings separate this exhibited project from the remaining exhibited 11 projects and 10 strategies.

The community engagement report will be considered at Coffs Harbour City Council Meeting on 28 February 2013. Should the plans be endorsed, an IPART Application for special rate variation (subject to council approval) will need to be made by 11 March 2013.

2 Methodology

The draft City Centre Master Plan and Regional Skate Plaza/Youth Space Concept Plan proposal was developed in consultation with stakeholders and the community in 2012. The draft plans went on public exhibition from 14 December 2012 to 28 January 2013. The timeframe has been set by State Government timelines in relation to making an application for the continuance of the CBD Special Rate variation that will provide the foundation funding for the improvements proposed in the Draft CBD Master Plan.

The City Centre Master Plan and Regional Skate Plaza/Youth Space Concept Plan proposals were made available for viewing at the Coffs Harbour City Council Chambers, the Coffs Harbour, Sawtell and Woolgoolga libraries and on the website at www.coffscity.com.au.

The majority of submissions received were via email, only a handful was received by mail .ln addition, the website www.coffscity.com.au received Y posts.

This publicity, complemented with radio coverage on 2HC, has optimised community awareness of the City Centre Master Plan and Regional Skate Plaza/Youth Space Concept Plan proposal.

Workshops

Consultation was undertaken in multiple stages to feed into the iterative planning process. The three community engagement workshops for the City Centre master planning process were held on 17 September, 10 October and 15 November 2012. Engagement techniques ranged from independently facilitated workshop that involved a combination of individual and large group visioning and exploration sessions, to charrettes and small group work with urban designers


The workshops were attended by approximately 150 Coffs residents and their contribution has delivered outputs that have steadily informed the master planning design team. The community feedback throughout the process has been consistent. All agreed the master plan objective is about revitalising the Coffs City Centre to stimulate economic activity. Participants told us they want to see a change in how people live, work and move through the City Centre in order to create a more vibrant hub for the region.

The master plan urban design team identified, with the consent of the workshop participants, a vision that Coffs City Centre can be the beating heart of the Coffs Coast. The heart of Coffs City Centre will remain as Harbour Drive and the City Square whilst growing towards its natural assets to become a vibrant, connected and green City Centre.

Council has been working hard with the community, the master plan working group and urban design specialists to create a recommendation that aims to reposition the City Centre as a 21st century city which attracts investment, new business, new residents and is the centre of cultural life and events. This current public exhibition, 14th December 2012 to 28th January 2013, has been controlled by the State Government time lines which Council has been required to work within.

3 Overall community response to the exhibition

The response to the exhibited Coffs Harbour City Centre Master Plan 2031 proposal has been significant. Over 90% of submissions support the master plan, with 195 formal submissions (emails and letters) yielding 960 unique comments (points) plus 139 posts on the official exhibition website www.coffscity.com.au.



Graph 1 shows mix of responses for the reported exhibited categories

Ten strategies and 12 projects (includes Brelsford Park) were exhibited; items within projects attracted the most submissions:

- 674 comments were received for the 11 exhibited projects, yielding 573 supportive comments, 36 objections and 65 requests
- Brelsford Park attracted 196 comments, 148 supportive comments, 29 neutral comments or request and 19 opposing comments
- 89 submissions were received for the exhibited 10 strategies, yielding 27 supportive comments, 31 requests and 31 opposing comments.

A dedicated website, featuring key content from the full prosperity plan, attracted 1,319 unique visitors during the exhibition period. The PDF Prosperity Plan was downloaded over 300 times. 137 posts were made online, the majority for the Brelsford Park Skate Park proposal.

General feedback: common comments

Most of the submissions received supported all or various elements of the exhibited plan. Typical supportive submissions about the overall exhibition content and process included:

- 133 form based submissions supported all 10 master plan strategies and 12 master plan projects subject to several comments incorporated in table 1
- The process was often complimented and never criticised:
 - "The community is supportive of the process"
 - "I have viewed the CBD Master Plan and congratulate those concerned with putting out a great vision for the city for future years"
 - "... it will bring an enormous array of business opportunities and of course residents wishing to relocate...from larger cities and offshore."

Most objections were directed to specific elements within the plans and are incorporated in the following sections of this report. The more general concerns included:

- "The plan has failed to adequately recognise and respond to critical contextual issues that have confronted the CBD in the past and continue to challenge its future"
- "Senior citizens, which could be in the vicinity of 35% of the population, have been completely ignored in the master plan. This number will only increase."
- "There is no traffic management plan which is essential to inform other key master plan strategies"
- "The Master Plan focuses the majority of the benefits of the special rate to the owners on the eastern side of Pacific Highway, while the western side will see very little of the collected proposed special rate despite representing something like 23% of the CBD rate payers by property numbers."

Often requests or comments were made that neither supported nor rejected aspects of the exhibited plan, such examples follow:

- The community is supportive of the process, however, believed the Draft Prosperity
 Plan exhibited required further community input
- The Plan does not yet articulate a compelling vision and clear path for implementation to guide future development and strategic investment in Coffs Harbour CBD for the long term
- There is insufficient time to properly complete this plan to meet IPART requirements
- A need for an overall master plan that incorporates all strategies and demonstrates how they work together in an integrated way for mutual benefit.


Several submissions identified funding as a potential issue:

- "Financing of the master plan special levy needs to be clear to avoid a perception of compromised essential services"
- "Has any consideration ever been given to a "poll" tax, so that in order to obtain what Coffs needs, ALL residents pay, renters as well as rate payers? A User pays system"
- "I object to 10 million dollars of rate-payers money to be spent on this project."

4 Summary of CBD submissions (projects and strategies)

The significant majority of community feedback, 822 comments from the 195 formal submissions (letter and emails), were for projects (note Brelsford Park data is excluded and addressed in Chapter 5 of this report).

625 comments supported CBD projects and strategies, 109 made neutral comments or requests and 88 comments opposed the exhibited CBD projects and strategies.



Graph 2 shows the mix of submission types for all ten strategies and all 11 projects (excludes Brelsford Park) exhibited.


The most mentioned exhibited CBD items were:

- 1 The City Square Cultural Building project was the second most popular exhibited item, with 172 submissions, of which 139 supported, eight opposed and 25 made requests
- 2 The City Square yielded 165 submissions, made up of 139 submissions, 25 requests and one opposing submission
- 3 City Sails yielded 140 submissions, with one opposition and
- 4 The Events Program attracted 135 supportive submissions.

Project submissions (excludes Brelsford Park)

674 submissions were received for the exhibited projects, and of these, 573 supported, 36 opposed and 65 made requests.

Graph 3 below shows the mix of submissions that supported, opposed and made requests for the exhibited projects.



The following table lists each strategy exhibited and the most mentioned comment or objection for Council consideration.

Given the overall support received for the plan, the following comments or objections represent the exception to the volume of supporting submissions. The purpose of featuring the following is to avoid duplicating what has been supported and therefore featured in the draft proposal and highlight what are the most common objections or requests for Council to consider.



Strategy submissions

The exhibited strategies attracted 89 comments compared with 674 project submissions.

5 Summary of Brelsford Park submissions

Brelsford Park (The Skate Park Concept Plan) yielded strong youth representation with 196 comments: 148 were supportive, 19 opposed and 29 made requests, mostly about the skate park design elements.

The strong youth support was reflected in the volume of web posts on www.coffscity.com.au. Of the 135 web posts for the entire exhibition (strategies and projects), 75 were for Brelsfod Park. The significant majority supported the Skate Park plan; most requests were for specific design treatment (see appendix for details).

The above image demonstrates the online support Brelsford Park received on www.coffscity.com.au with 75 posts: the City Square Cultural Building attracted 11 posts. All other items on the website each attracted either no posts or less than five.

6 Recommendations

- Council, with Roberts Day, to review and consider all submissions and, where submissions are unable to be progressed, develop a response to be used upon further community enquiry
- Straight Talk to publish a Council approved community engagement report via the website <u>www.coffscity.com.au</u>
- Council to develop a media release detailing exhibition participation levels, key findings and next steps
- The community engagement report should be made available to the public, via the master plan website, in early February.
