Lachlan valley – Draft Report WaterNSW rural bulk water services IPART

What is this fact sheet about?

We have released a Draft Report and Draft Determination on our review of the maximum prices that WaterNSW can charge for its rural bulk water services, from 1 July 2017 for a period of four years. This fact sheet highlights key draft decisions made as part of our review that affect the Lachlan valley.

This information is not exhaustive. Further information is available in our General Overview Fact Sheet and our Draft Report.



Bills would decrease or remain the same under draft prices

Bill impacts for a 'typical' customer in the Lachlan valley under our Draft Determination are presented in Table 1.

- Under our Draft Determination, bills would decrease slightly for high security (HS) customers, and remain the same for general security (GS) customers in the Lachlan valley (in nominal terms – ie, with inflation).
 - The decrease in HS customers' bills is largely due to a reduction in the customer share of WaterNSW's operating expenditure in this valley.
- Bills would also be lower than those proposed by WaterNSW.



Usage and high security entitlement charges would decrease

- ▼ In real terms, HS entitlement charges and usage charges in the Lachlan valley would decrease under our Draft Determination, whilst GS entitlement charges would increase.
- GS entitlement charges would increase because of:
 - Our draft decision to include a volatility allowance (\$0.20 per ML) in the charge to manage revenue volatility risk faced by WaterNSW associated with the 40:60 fixed to variable tariff structure relative to its 80:20 fixed:variable cost structure.
 - Our draft decision to discontinue the unders and overs mechanism (UOM) and adjust prices to ensure the outstanding balance of the UOM account is paid back (by about \$0.78 per ML per year, on average).
- Our draft prices for HS entitlement charges are higher than those proposed by WaterNSW.
 - This is due to an increase in the volatility allowance (from \$0.00 to \$0.58 per ML per year) included in our HS charges compared to WaterNSW's proposed charges.
- However, our draft GS entitlement charges are lower than those proposed by WaterNSW.
 - This is due to a decrease in the volatility allowance (from \$1.32 to \$0.20 per ML per year) included in our GS charges compared to WaterNSW's proposed charges.
