IPART review of local council domestic waste management charges

I refer to IPART's Discussion Paper and review of local council domestic waste management charges, and comment as follows on behalf of Port Macquarie - Hastings Council:

1. Are there concerns with the prices councils charge for domestic waste management services? Why/why not?

Port Macquarie - Hastings Council (PMHC) sets its domestic waste management services charges on a "cost recovery" and "user pays" basis.

IPART's proposed key pricing principles for domestic waste management charges appear reasonable and generally in line with PMHC's current "user pays" and "cost recovery" approach.


